This publication does not cover Sida's international development co-operation in detail since this information is published in Sida's Statistical Report 2000. Our ambition with these two publications has been to fill out the voluminous material with explanatory texts. We hope that this will make it easier for the reader to grasp some of the interesting tendencies and relationships in the tables and charts.

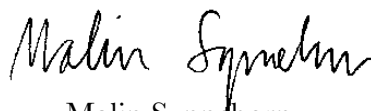
This booklet is divided into three parts. First we report on Sweden's international development co-operation. Then we present Sweden's co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe. Finally we describe the statistics on global international development co-operation where, among other things, Swedish development co-operation is related to that of other countries.

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SWEDEN'S INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION

Objectives of Sweden's development co-operation

In 1962, in the first Government bill on Swedish international development co-operation (1962:100), the overall aim was to improve the living standards of poor groups of people. In 1978, this focus was confirmed and further developed to include "achieving an improved standard of living and more equal living conditions for poorer groups, so that their basic needs can be fulfilled and they can participate in political decision-making which steers social development" (UU 1978/79:1). The following objectives were established:

- Economic growth
- Economic and social equality
- Economic and political independence
- Democratic government

Later, two further objectives were adopted:

- Sustainable management of natural resources and protection of the environment (1988)
- Promotion of equality between women and men (1996)

Alleviation of poverty

More than 30 years' experience has provided the insight and knowledge that poverty alleviation requires an integrated approach, in which the inter-relationship between political, economic, environmental and social development is decisive.

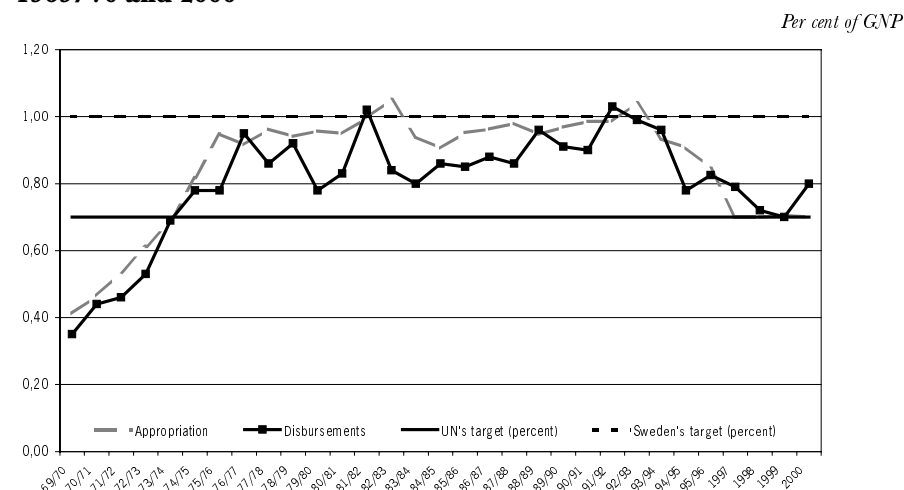
The definitions of poverty and good living conditions made by people themselves must be used as the point of departure for poverty alleviation. Poverty does not only encompass the lack of material resources but is also closely connected to human rights. Poor countries themselves must take the lead in the struggle against poverty. The role of development co-operation is to support and influence changes in Sweden's partner countries with the aid of dialogue.

UN's objectives for development co-operation

The UN has laid down that donor countries should disburse 0.7 per cent of their GNP in Official Development Assistance (ODA). In 2000, only four countries managed to achieve this level. One of these countries was Sweden; the others were Denmark, Netherlands and Norway (Chart 8, page 23).

ODA is, briefly, the flow of funds from official authorities to the countries included on DAC's Part I list¹⁾. The primary goal of these funds shall be to promote economic development and welfare in developing countries and shall consist of a grant element of at least 25 per cent.

Chart 1: Appropriations and disbursements between the years 1969/70 and 2000



Since 1974/75, Sweden has maintained a level of support which has exceeded the UN target of 0.7 per cent of GNP. During the 1980s and the beginning of the 1990s, Sweden's ODA was at a high level in comparison to GNP. During the last few years, however, Sweden's disbursements have decreased slightly and, at the same time, GNP has increased. This has resulted in a decrease in the proportion of GNP allocated to ODA. In 2000 though, an increase can be seen once again as Swedish ODA/GNP was 0,8 per cent of GNP.

Bilateral and multilateral development co-operation

Sweden’s international development co-operation is dominated by bilateral co-operation. Over two-thirds of the total funds allocated are for bilateral co-operation.

Chart 2: Breakdown of funds allocated to bilateral and multilateral development co-operation 2000

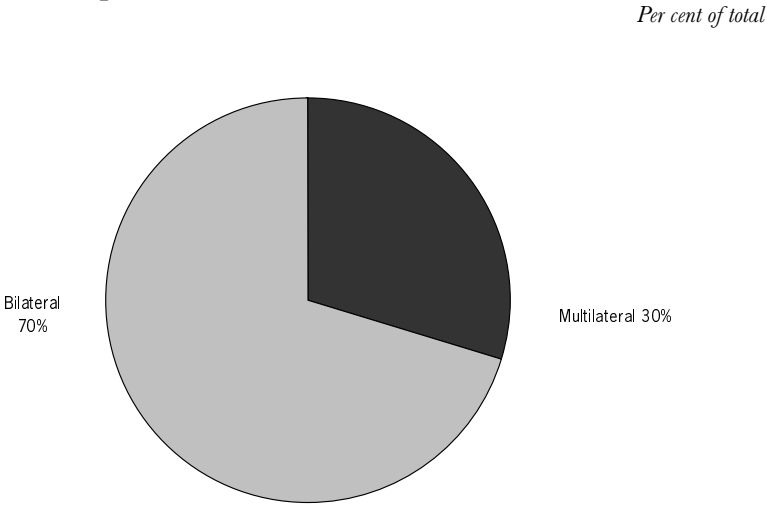


Table 2 (next page) shows the breakdown of Sweden’s development co-operation between authorities or organisations responsible for bilateral and multilateral co-operation in the last few years. Sida is the largest authority involved in Swedish bilateral development co-operation, and had a share of 88 per cent in 2000. The Ministry for Foreign Affairs was responsible for almost all of the Swedish multilateral development co-operation in 2000.

Bilateral development co-operation

Sweden's development co-operation is mostly provided in the form of bilateral assistance. This is defined as direct development co-operation between Sweden and the individual countries concerned. Most Swedish bilateral development co-operation, 88 per cent in 2000, is the responsibility of Sida.

The contributions to Africa decreased considerably during the first part of the 1990s, while contributions to the other continents remained at a fairly constant level. Between 1999 and 2000 we can notice an increase in the support to Africa once again.

Support to Europe increased during the first part of the period as a result of the conflict in the Western Balkans.

Fixed prices, SEK

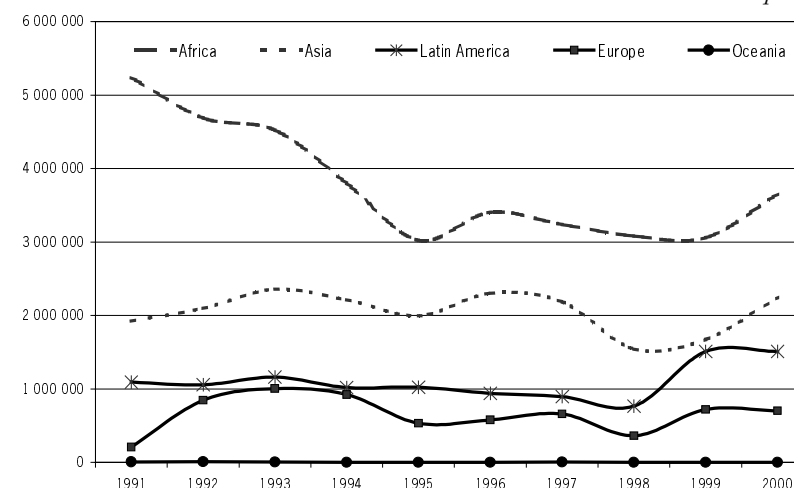

Country strategies and action programmes

Sweden's development co-operation has a number of different forms in order to meet the needs of each co-operation activity and the situation in each individual country. The partner countries differ considerably and their potential for development is equally diverse. Sweden has established country strategies for the largest partner countries. These country strategies are Sweden's most important instrument for monitoring development co-operation at national level.

The focus of support and selection of sectors, programmes and projects are based on this overall assessment. This approach also determines decisions on the scope of co-operation, time schedules, forms of financing and participants. Sida's support has the aim of reflecting the efforts, reality and development needs of each individual country. Sida's operations are based on a holistic approach, which also

takes into account the opportunities available to Sweden to make meaningful contributions.

Sida has established action programmes in pivotal areas of international development co-operation: Poverty alleviation; Peace, democracy & human rights; Gender equality; and Environment & sustainable development.

The country strategies and the four action programmes form the basis of the selection of inputs in each individual country and the concentration of operations to central sectors or problem areas. Sida plans new activities jointly with partner countries.

Percentage (%) gives each country's share of Sweden's total bilateral development co-operation. Nicaragua, for example, received 2,7 per cent of Sweden's disbursements in 2000.

The accumulated percentage (Acc%) gives the size of the share of Sweden's total bilateral development co-operation which the countries receive together,

for example, the six largest countries (Tanzania, Mozambique, Honduras, Viet Nam, Yugoslavia and Nicaragua) together received 20,6 per cent of Sweden's total development co-operation.

Altogether the 50 largest bilateral partner countries received slightly more than 60 per cent of Sweden's total bilateral development co-operation.

Some countries have been among the ten largest partner countries throughout the entire decade; Tanzania, Mozambique, Viet Nam and Nicaragua. The share of Swedish co-operation allocated to Nicaragua and Honduras increased at the end of the 1990s mostly due to the humanitarian assistance and reconstruction activities resulting from the hurricane Mitch.

India was Sweden's third and second largest partner country in 1990 and 1995 respectively, but is not among the ten largest in 2000. In 1998, after the nuclear tests in May 1998, the Swedish government cancelled the co-operation agreement (1997-1999) with India. The cancellation resulted in a gradual decrease of bilateral contributions in 1999 and 2000. The support to some 20 Indian NGOs has continued.

Multilateral development co-operation

Thirty per cent of Sweden's development co-operation is multilateral, i.e. provided in the form of support via multilateral organisations (Chart 2, page 5). The Ministry for Foreign Affairs (MFA) has the sole responsibility for these activities. Support to multilateral co-operation is provided through regular contributions and assistance towards the core funding of multilateral organisations. (Multilateral assistance, i.e. bilateral co-operation implemented by multilateral organisations, is registered as bilateral co-operation.) By utilising the comparative advantages of the different organisations, the multilateral system's total development effects are maximised.

Sweden tries to ensure that the activities of the UN and the World Bank are co-ordinated efficiently, especially in recipient countries.

Most of Sweden's multilateral co-operation (46,5 per cent in 2000) is channelled through the UN and its various agencies. The World Bank Group, regional development banks, other development banks and funds, and the EU implement other programmes of multilateral co-operation.

SWEDEN'S CO-OPERATION WITH CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE

Goals for co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe

Sweden has given extensive support to the reform process in Central and Eastern Europe since 1989. In 1995 a bill was passed unanimously by the Swedish Parliament. The present programme of co-operation is based on this bill.

Co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe has a different focus from that of Sweden's other development co-operation activities and is guided by four goals adopted by the Swedish parliament:

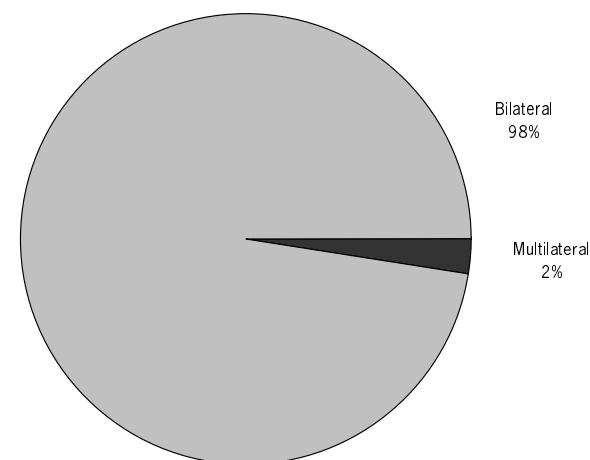
- A. To promote common security
- B. To deepen the culture of democracy
- C. To support environmentally sustainable development
- D. To support socially sustainable economic transition

Co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe is also guided by Sida's action programmes. (The action programme for poverty alleviation is not applicable to co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe).

Programmes of co-operation shall be permeated by a perspective of equality between women and men. The programmes shall also facilitate the candidate countries' adaptation to the requirements of the EU.

Sida's assignments are based on problems and needs in the partner countries. Sida's task is to help the partner countries to manage without external support. Sida is responsible for ensuring that all Swedish co-operation is used for the right projects and is implemented in the right way.

Support to Central and Eastern Europe increased during the 1990s, though less support was given in 1994 and 1995.

Bilateral co-operation

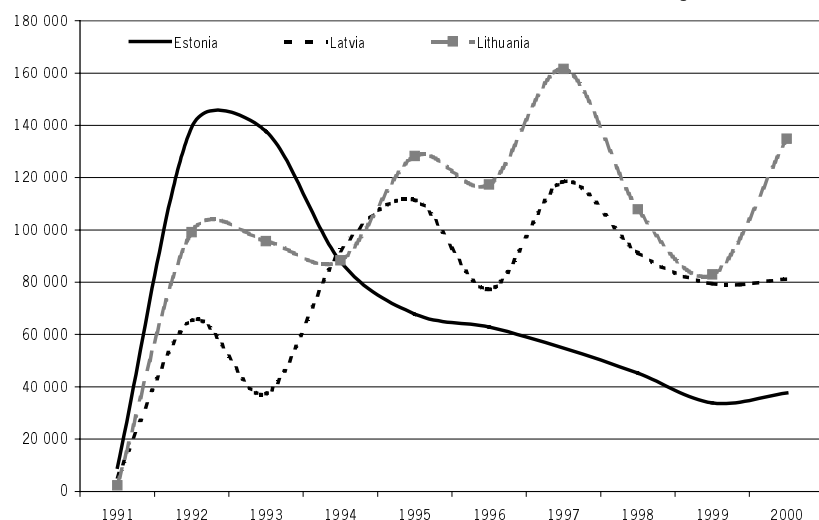
Sida is the largest agency and is responsible for 63 per cent of Swedish bilateral co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs used to be the agency responsible for this co-operation but transferred this responsibility to the new Sida when it was founded in 1995.

Most of Sweden's co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe is in the form of bilateral assistance. This is defined as direct development co-operation between Sweden and the individual countries concerned. Most bilateral development co-operation is the responsibility of Sida.

Most of the support consists of the transfer of know-how and the exchange of experience in strategically important sectors in the region. Experts from companies, agencies and universities participate on the Swedish side. The authorities in the partner country make priorities in respect of the projects which shall be implemented. The partner country is responsible for the implementation of each project and pays part of the costs.

Fixed prices, SEK '000



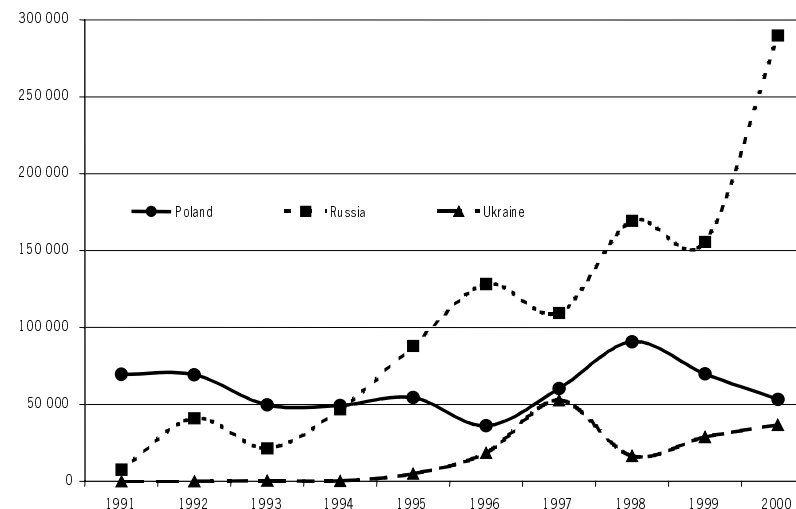
Co-operation with the Baltic countries started in 1991 when the countries achieved independence, but did not reach present levels until a year later.

Support to Estonia decreased from around SEK 150 million in 1992 to less than SEK 40 million in 1999 and 2000. The phasing out of certain parts of the support is under preparation.

Lithuania and Latvia, on the other hand, experienced increases in support until 1997 when the trend seems to have been reversed. In 2000 the support to Lithuania increased somewhat once again.

Sweden mainly supports projects in north-west Russia. Since 1991 support to Russia has increased from almost zero to around SEK 300 million.

Support to Poland has been fairly constant during the 1990s. The increases in 1997 and 1998 are due to the floods that occurred in the summer of 1997. Support to Poland is being phased out in accordance with the Government's country strategy.

Support to the Ukraine started in 1991 when the country was recognised but remained on a small scale until 1996 when Sida's co-operation with Ukraine started.

Multilateral co-operation

Sweden's multilateral co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe is the responsibility of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs. Most support is channelled through the European Commission (EC). Sweden contributes to this co-operation through a percentage of its annual membership fee to the EU.

The EU has two major programmes for co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe: Phare and Tacis. Phare includes countries in the Baltic Sea region, Central Europe and the Balkans. Tacis includes countries in the former Soviet Union, apart from the Baltic states.

Swedish multilateral support to Central and Eastern Europe increased considerably in 1995 due to Swedish membership of the EU. Thereafter multilateral support was fairly constant up to 1998 when we can note a decrease.

GLOBAL INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION

OECD/DAC compiles annual statistics from member countries and countries which have programmes of international development co-operation. The aim of these statistics is to provide an overall picture of global development co-operation and to enable comparisons to be made between donor countries.

A number of different types of information are collected: bilateral co-operation; multilateral co-operation; co-operation by target and sector; how co-operation

activities are financed (grants, credits, guarantees, loans, personnel etc.). Information on private flows of funds to developing countries is also collected.

All this information, plus studies and evaluations, are published in various publications as well as on OECD/DAC's web-site. There are also information databases at www.oecd.org/dac/htm/online.htm. Below a brief extract is given of the information available from DAC's database.

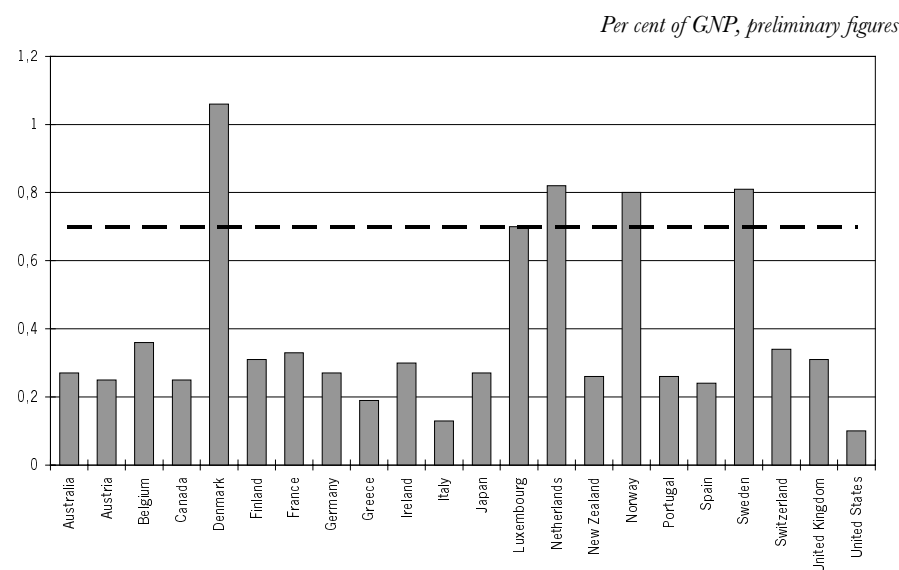

The donors providing most support in terms of money are the United States, Japan, France and Germany, but their support to developing countries only amounts to some 0.1-0.4 per cent of their GNP, as is the case for many other DAC countries. Denmark, Norway, the Netherlands and Sweden provide support to developing countries amounting to 0.7-1.0 per cent of their GNP.

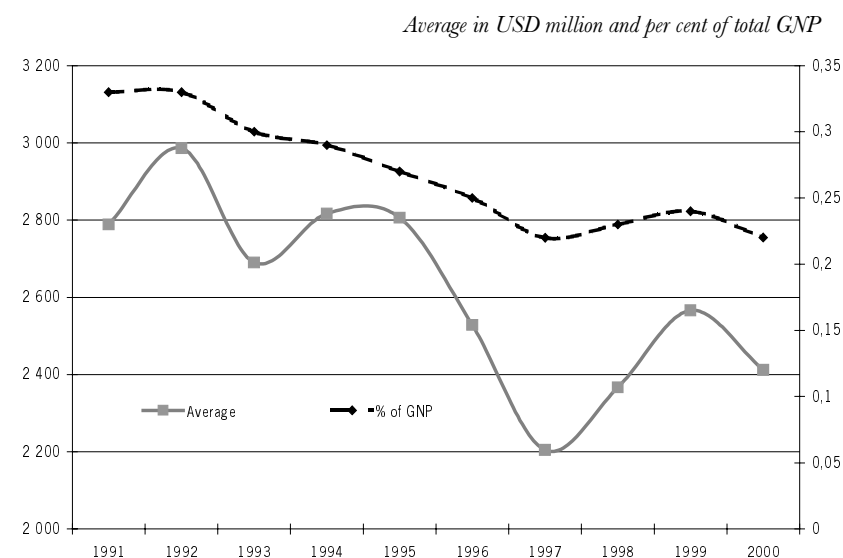
As mentioned above, Sweden has maintained a level in excess of UN's target of 0.7 per cent of GNP since 1974/75.

The support provided to developing countries by DAC member countries mostly shows a decreasing trend in the 1990s. From 1997 the trend seems to turn, both in terms of disbursements and in per cent of GNP. This might be a result of the goal to decrease poverty by 50 per cent before the year 2015.

In 1999 the DAC countries allocated, all in all, approximately 0.39 per cent of GNP to support for developing countries. This is far below the UN target of 0.7 per cent.

QUALITY ETC.

General

The information in this publication concerns Sweden's development co-operation, both multilateral and bilateral, and Sweden's co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe. It has been obtained from Sida, MFA, Swedish Armed Forces, Nordic Africa Institute, Swedish International Project for Nuclear Safety and Swedish Radiation Protection Institute.

To make the international statistics in this area comparable between donor countries, definitions and directives are drawn up and agreed upon by the member countries of OECD's Development Assistance Committee (DAC). Sweden makes considerable efforts to ensure that its statistics are comparable and correct.

All amounts show net disbursements, i.e. amounts paid out minus any repaid amounts (unutilised funds remaining after completion of a project or programme which are repaid to the donor), in SEK '000 (Swedish krona) and current prices, unless otherwise stated.

All information in the section "Global international development co-operation" has been obtained from OECD/DAC's database on the Internet.

Comparison with other publications

Sida's Annual Report

Sida's Annual Report shows Sida's responsibilities for Swedish development co-operation and Swedish co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe.

The annual report shows costs while this publication shows disbursements. The distinction between costs and disbursements is a matter of accounting techniques. Costs are the sum of the invoices which have been registered during a period of one year. Costs become disbursements only when invoices have been paid i.e. an invoice may be registered in 1999 but disbursement may not be made until 2000.

The operational areas shown in the annual report are not identical to the sectors presented here.

Sweden 1999 Statistical Yearbook

The publication is fully comparable with this publication.

Sida 2000 Statistical Report

The Statistical Report shows Sida's development co-operation and co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe in 1999. This publication shows all Swedish development co-operation and co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe, i.e. Sida is only one of the many parties involved.
