### Preface

This edition of Facts & Figures 1999, Health Development Programmes updates information on development co-operation within the field of Health and Development for the fiscal year 1999. This year's statistics will differ from earlier years, especially last years as a new, more elaborated, statistics classification system was brought into use during 1999. The statistical data for 1998 have been reclassified to suit the new classification. Since the new classification system was recently introduced it may not yet be used consistently by all the officers who classify Sida contributions. The system is also still subject to modifications and clarifications, so there may be some inconsistencies in the data.

I hope that information available in this document will be useful as background material for presentations and for the purpose of planning future co-operation programmes. Information provided is based on disbursements made by Sida (i.e. not plans, allocations or budgets). A deviation in the support to a specific project/programme may be explained by delayed disbursements. It does not, therefore, necessarily signify a reduced or an increased contribution in comparison to previous years. The word \*contribution may be used in the report meaning the same thing as disbursement.

This report has two parts: the first one giving an overview of the support including graphs and summary tables, the second containing detailed tables of the support.

For further information on the different areas of the health sector co-operation, for policies, strategies or results in terms of outputs and effects, other documents are available at the respective departments of Sida.

Facts & Figures covers all Swedish Government financed health sector development cooperation through Sida. Sida's health sector co-operation is mainly channelled through the Health development Division of the Department for Democracy and Social Development, DESO and the Embassies. However, most departments within Sida are engaged either directly or indirectly in the health development sector co-operation, in particular the Department for Co-operation with NGOs and Humanitarian Assistance, SEKA and in research co-operation through the Department for Research Co-operation, SAREC. Figures on health development sector support through all departments of Sida are included in this report.

## 1 Summary of Facts & Figures for 1999

- The total Swedish Development Assistance for Health constitutes approximately 13% (12%) of the total Swedish Development Cooperation or 1 244 MSEK (1 225 MSEK).
- Sida disbursed in total 932 MSEK for Health Development Cooperation during 1999 while the Ministry for Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs disbursed 275 MSEK, mainly constituting core multilateral assistance to UN agencies. The disbursements by Sida increased by 5% compared to previous year.
- Of the Sida disbursements for Health Development, more than half of it (57%) was administrated through DESO and the Embassies.
- Both the DESO and Sida disbursements for Health Development increased from previous year.
- The area of Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) including HIV/AIDS received most support and was the fastest growing programme area. It increased by 6,9% from last year.
- Africa was the continent received most (one third), but Latin America grew with 29,3% that is more than the growth of the support to Africa.
- The support to some special target groups was reduced e.g. urban and rural areas
- Just more than one fifth of the disbursements had environment objectives.
- Two third of the disbursements had gender equality objectives. Almost 80% of the DESO disbursements were gender oriented. Of the DESO disbursements, 40% had gender equality as the main objective, an increase since 1998.
- The Health Development disbursements were also more concerned with peace, democracy
  and human rights than Sida disbursements in general, but mainly through secondary objectives.
- Of the Health Development disbursements, 80% were related to poverty reduction, mainly indirectly through policy and institutional support. It is slightly less than 1998 and Sida in general.

## 2 An Overview of Swedish Health Development Cooperation

The overall objectives for Sida's Health Development Cooperation are to promote:

- a sustainable and effective health system
- a nation-wide coverage of health services of acceptable quality, according to principle of social equity and gender equality
- a strengthened role for the health sector in influencing other sector policies towards better health.


The development cooperation aims at strengthening the capacity of national health systems and institutions and at providing financial and technical assistance for the implementation of different health programmes.

The main partners in the health sector cooperation are Ministries of Health. Other partners are UN agencies and international and national non-governmental organisations.

The total Swedish Development Assistance in the health sector constitutes approximately 13% (12%) of the total Swedish Development Cooperation or 1 244 MSEK (1 225 MSEK).

Sida disbursed 932  $(930)^3$  MSEK or 75% (76%) of the total Swedish support for Health and Development.

From Sida Health Development Cooperation was disbursed as follows:

- Bilateral and Regional programmes as well as Development Funds constituted 529 (404) MSEK or 57 (43) % and were administered by Embassies and the Health Division at the Department for Democracy and Social Development, DESO.
- Health Sector Cooperation through Swedish NGOs and Disaster Relief amounted to 221 (367) MSEK or 24 (40) % and was administered by the Department for Cooperation with NGOs and Humanitarian Assistance, SEKA.
- Health Research Cooperation amounted to 97 (103) MSEK or 10 (11) % and was administered by the Department for Research Cooperation, SAREC.
- Health Sector Cooperation with Central and Eastern European Countries amounted to 64 (37)
   MSEK or 7 (4) % and was administered by the Department for Central and Eastern Europe,
   Sida-EAST.
- Development Credits and International Courses amounted to 21 (19) MSEK or 2 (2) % and was administered by the Sida Department for Infrastructure and Economic Cooperation, INEC.


#### 3 Sub-sectors

The Sida Health Development Cooperation can be divided into four sub-sectors or programme areas:


- **Health System Development** amounted to 213 (120) MSEK, of which 189 (99) through DESO
- Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR) and Child health amounted to 284 (265) MSEK, of which 219 (185) through DESO
- **Public Health** amounted to 164 (176) MSEK, of which 65 (61) through DESO
- **Other Health Cooperation** amounted to 271 (369) MSEK, of which 56 (58) through DESO.

### 3.1 Health Systems Development

The area of Health System Development focuses on issues that relate to the functioning of the overall health system. It is concerned with issues such as health sector reform, health policy formulation, the organisation of the health sector and the financing of its activities. The issue of SWAP, i.e. Sector Wide Approach is also part of the health systems development. One very important area within the health system is pharmaceuticals. Equity concerns are always on top of the agenda when discussing the health system.

One important task is to give support and advise in health systems and health reform issues in the bilateral and regional cooperation.

Within the work of health systems development, a wide range of activities is currently going on. Examples of this work include the development of so called National Health Accounts, WHO activities in the field of Health Systems, Regional Network on Health Economics and Health Policy in Southern Africa, Courses on Health System Development (together with INEC, see below), and Courses on Health Financing (part of World Bank Flagship Course)

Other areas of closer analysis are decentralisation within the health sector and its effects on poverty, democratisation and gender equity, health care financing, and contracting within the health sector.

The disbursements to the development of health systems have increased much since 1998.

### 3.2 Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights (SRHR)

The aim of the co-operation in this field is multifaceted. People should be able to avoid illness and disability in their sexual and reproductive lives, and be able to have the number of children they wish. To reduce maternal mortality and morbidity is one major component in this area. In order to achieve this, Sida has selected a number of strategic areas in which to focus its attention. These are:

- Enhancement of increased awareness of international human rights treaties and conventions with relevance for gender equality;
- Access to effective health services provided by trained health professionals during pregnancy, at delivery and for new-born children;
- Easily accessible services for fertility regulations with personal counselling,
- Attention to methods to make abortions safe through legislation and good quality of services;
- Develop good youth friendly health services and enhance sexuality education for young people;
- Support work against female genital mutilation;
- Enhance analysis and actions against gender-based discrimination and violence.

#### As to **HIV/AIDS** Sida works towards the following goals:

- to enable people to protect themselves against HIV infection irrespective of marital status or age;
- to encourage greater political commitment to HIV prevention programs;
- to allow people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS to pursue their lives with quality and dignity;
- to develop coping strategies to alleviate long term effects of the epidemic.

The disbursements to this sub-sector have increased during 1999, particularly to reproductive health and rights.

#### 3.3 Public Health

Another main area of the Health Division is that of Public Health. Public Health concerns are consistently becoming more obvious in many different fields of international development cooperation. The intensified global effort to combat poverty is one important factor. Another factor is the changing disease pattern, the so called "health transition", which occurs when countries develop, i.e. the major health problems change from infectious diseases to chronic diseases, cardiovascular problems and injuries, all highly related to lifestyles.

Public Health focuses on a multi-disciplinary approach and to connect different sectors in society in order to enhance and develop further the cooperation between the sectors. Public Health is, thus, seen as the structures on all different levels in society by which health of the population is understood, safeguarded and prevented. The physical environment is regarded as a resource for improving living conditions and increasing well being. Health is also highly sensitive to socio-economic conditions such as income, education and employment. Changes over time in the health status of disadvantaged groups are powerful indicators for assessing the success of socio-economic policies.

The Health Division is focusing to develop a more comprehensive strategy, which highlights the relationships between health and development, including the role of public health interventions.

Such a strategy would give guidance on how all of Sida's various programs may contribute in a more strategic way to improve the health of the people in the partner countries.

The area of Public Health is concerned with such areas as narcotics and tobacco, environmental health, children's rights, disabled person's rights, poverty and gender issues.

### 3.4 Other Health Cooperation


Nearly one third of the total Sida Health Sector Cooperation was classified as Other Health Cooperation. Almost all of it, 218 of 242 (337 of 355) MSEK, refers to General Support, which cannot be classified in the other categories. The rest was infrastructure, equipment and material. The DESO component for Other within Health Care amounts to 28 MSEK (33 MSEK).



## 4 Geographical Distribution

Africa received 35% of the total health cooperation disbursements during 1999, a reduction from 40% in 1998. In addition, Asia decreased from 24% to 20%. The disbursements to global projects increased during 1999.



### 5 Sida Departments and Multilateral Core Support

#### 5.1 DESO: Country Programmes and Special Programme

The largest share of the DESO health sector cooperation consists of support to Country Programmes. This includes bilateral health cooperation in Sida Programme Countries and a large regional programme in Central America.

The disbursements for 1999 by Country Programme and per programme area are provided in table section 2. The tables indicate the distribution of funds between programme areas and components based on the Sida system of classification of activities. The Special Programme funds were channelled mainly to or through UN agencies, NGOs and institutions.

#### 5.2 Sida EAST

One of four goals for Swedish cooperation with countries in Central and Eastern Europe, financed through Sida Department for Central and Eastern Europe, is to support a socially sustainable economic transition. Support to the health sector is mainly aiming at reform of the health care system and development of public health activities.

#### **5.3 SEKA**

Approximately 10% of the total disbursements from the Sida Department for Cooperation with NGOs and Humanitarian Assistance (SEKA), to development activities through NGOs are directed to health sector related projects and programmes. The development support is being channelled through (13) so-called frame- or umbrella organisations that in turn distribute the Sida funds to more than 300 individual organisations.

The Sida support to Humanitarian Assistance (Disaster Relief) included support through national NGOs and through the UN system.

#### **5.4 INEC**

The Sida Department for Infrastructure and Economic Cooperation (INEC) offers a wide range of technical courses in the International Training Programmes. The dominating themes focused on sexual and reproductive health (SRSR) and occupational health. The SRHR programmes aim at the improvement of sexual and reproductive health and rights by actions in health care along with intersectorial action in society. The Occupational Health programmes aim at giving the participants the capacity to initiate and monitor systematic actions for improving occupational safety, health and work productivity to fit the conditions of participant countries.

#### 5.5 SAREC

Swedish development cooperation in the area of research is mainly channelled through the Sida Department for Research Cooperation (SAREC). Health research is supported as part of bilateral programmes of research cooperation with a number of developing countries, mainly Vietnam, Mozambique, Tanzania, Zimbabwe, Ethiopia and Nicaragua. These programmes aim to contribute to the development of national research capacity.

SAREC also supports international and other special health research programmes of relevance for development countries. This includes substantial contributions to the HRP, TDR and other research programmes within WHO as well as support to ICDDR/B in Bangladesh. SAREC also

supports international initiatives (such as COHRED and Global Forum for Health Research) engaged in promoting essential national health research as well as international partnerships in research, addressing the health problems of developing countries.

Finally a small part of SAREC's budget is devoted to health development research carried out by Swedish research institutions with a view to promote the involvement of Swedish scientists in research cooperation with Third World countries.

### 5.6 Multilateral Core Support

Sweden has a long-standing involvement in the reform of the UN system. As concerns the field of health, **WHO** – the World Health Organisation, is recognised as the main actor. In cooperation with the Swedish Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs a policy dialogue has been on-going in order to make Swedish aid more effective and to influence the reform process of WHO. The Swedish core contribution to WHO in 1999 was 34,4 MSEK (34,0 MSEK) disbursed by the Swedish Ministry of Health and Social Affairs. The Pan American Health Organisation, **PAHO**, is a regional part of WHO in the Americas and an important channel for Swedish health cooperation in Central America.

**UNICEF** has for many years been entrusted with a large core support from Sweden. Sida has also channelled funds through UNICEF for implementing bilateral programmes in seven countries. Special programme support to certain normative work is also provided. The Swedish core contribution to UNICEF in 1999 was 265,0 MSEK disbursed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Approximately 25% of this core contribution is estimated to be utilised for the health sector, 66,3 MSEK (63,0 MSEK).

The cooperation with **UNFPA** consists mainly of financial core support from Sweden and policy level meetings. The Swedish core contribution in 1999 to UNFPA was 140,0 MSEK (125,0 MSEK)

**UNAIDS**, the Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS, is a programme cosponsored by six UN organisations with the purpose to co-ordinate the UN efforts on HIV/AIDS prevention and care. The focus of UNAIDS is to strengthen the capability of the countries to respond effectively to the AIDS epidemic. The six cosponsors are UNDP, UNESCO, UNFPA, UNICEF, WHO and World Bank. The Swedish contribution to Regular Budget (core contribution) in 1999 was 37,0 MSEK (37,0 MSEK) disbursed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.


**The World Bank** is the largest actor on the global health assistance arena. The DESO/Health Division has cooperation with the World Bank both at global policy level and through co-financing projects at country level in four countries.

### 6 Target Groups and Areas

Sida classifies the activities by different target groups: age, sex, special groups and urban/rural.


### 6.1 Age groups

The targeting of special age groups has decreased since 1998.




### 6.2 Gender

Women are targeted slightly less 1999 than 1998. Targeting of men is very limited in the health development cooperation.




### 6.3 Special groups

The targeting of special groups is limited. The refugees got less than 1% and minorities including aborigines got 1% of the disbursements in health sector cooperation. Disabled people got 2% of the disbursements.



### 6.4 Urban/rural


Although DESO and Sida have substantially reduced the special support to rural areas since 1998, there was still some more support to rural areas than urban areas 1999.



### 7 Sida's Four Action Programmes


Sida also classifies the activities according to their main development goals; poverty reduction, democracy, gender equality and environmentally sustainable development.

### 7.1 Environment and sustainable development



Environment relevance of health development cooperation is less than that of the total Sida cooperation.


### 7.2 Gender equality



Gender equality is much more the objective at DESO compared to other Sida health development cooperation and Sida overall cooperation disbursements. The main objectives are more gender related in 1999 compared with 1998.


### 7.3 Peace, democracy and human rights

The health development cooperation has peace, democracy and human rights as the main objective more than Sida in general, but mostly as a secondary objective. DESO has increased its democracy consideration from 1998.



### 7.4 Poverty reduction

The health development cooperation (particularly by DESO) reduces poverty mainly through direct as well as indirect influence (policy and institutional support) and less through general support. The direct influence as well as overall influence is, however, reduced since 1998.
