Sida's development co-operation

Six development co-operation objectives

Sida's programmes of development co-operation are implemented in Africa, Asia, Latin America and certain European countries. Co-operation is guided by one overall goal – to raise the standard of living of poor people in the world. The Swedish Parliament has adopted the following six specific objectives in order to achieve this overall goal.

- **Economic growth** Sida shall contribute to increase the production of goods and services.
- Economic and political independence Sida shall enable the partner countries to make their own decisions on their economies and other matters and to create the conditions necessary for national self-determination.
- Economic and social equality Sida shall contribute to reducing differences between rich and poor and to enabling partner countries to meet the basic needs of all their people.
- **Democratic development in society** Sida shall help bring about the conditions necessary to give people greater influence over development at local, regional and national levels.
- Consideration of the environment Sida shall contribute to long term, sustainable management of natural resources and protection of the environment.
- **Gender equality** Sida shall promote equality between women and men.

Development co-operation by country and sector

Sida's partner countries differ considerably and their preconditions for development are equally diverse. Where the largest partner countries are concerned, Sida establishes country strategies, which are then adopted by the Government of Sweden. These country strategies are Sweden's most important instrument for monitoring development co-operation at national level.

The focus of support and selection of sectors, programmes and projects are based on this overall assessment. This approach also determines decisions concerning the scope of co-operation, time schedules, forms of financing and participants. Sida's support shall reflect the efforts, reality and development needs of each individual country. Sida's operations are based on a holistic approach, which also takes into consideration Sweden's opportunities to make meaningful contributions.

Disbursements 2001

In 2001 Sida disbursed SEK 11,537,407 thousand for development co-operation. In addition to this Sida used SEK 467,404 thousand for administration.

Of the funds, 30.7 per cent (SEK 3,545,356 thousand) were allocated to countries in *Africa*. The main partner countries in 2001 have been Tanzania, Mozambique, Uganda, South Africa, Ethiopia, Zambia, Kenya, Angola, Namibia, Rwanda, Zimbabwe, Sudan and Eritrea. Most of these countries are among the poorest in the world. Development co-operation is perceived as a means to strengthen society: it combats poverty, encourages economic, social and democratic reforms, and protects the environment. Of the funds allocated to Africa, 29.2 per cent (SEK 1,036,833 thousand) financed projects in the

social sectors, and 19.4 per cent (SEK 687,184 thousand) financed infrastructure, trade and industry, and urban development projects.

Countries in *Asia* received 21.5 per cent (SEK 2,479,884 thousand) of the funds. The main partner countries were Vietnam, Bangladesh, Palestinian Administrated Areas, Afghanistan, Sri Lanka, Cambodia, Nepal, Laos and India. The profile of co-operation can be described as a means to change society. It works with poverty reduction, the environment, social reforms, democracy and equality. Of the funds 35.6 per cent (SEK 883,297 thousand) were allocated to projects in the infrastructure, trade and industry, and urban development sectors, and 26.2 per cent (SEK 648,507 thousand) to the social sectors.


Latin America's share of the funds was 12.5 per cent (SEK 1,437,031 thousand) in 2001. The main partner countries were Honduras, Nicaragua, Bolivia, Guatemala and El Salvador. The aim is to integrate society, and Sida works with peace and reconciliation, democracy, equality and human rights. Of the funds, 28.9 per cent (SEK 415,332 thousand) were allocated to human rights and democratic governance and 26.6 per cent (SEK 381,959 thousand) to infrastructure, trade and industry, and urban development.

Some 7.7 per cent (SEK 890,727 thousand) of the funds were allocated to *Europe* (Western Balkans and Caucasus). The objective in the Western Balkans is to make long-term peace possible in the region and to facilitate the integration, in the long term, of the new states in the Balkans into European co-operation. Of the funds 47.9 per cent (SEK 426,919 thousand) were allocated to projects in the sectors of infrastructure, trade and industry, and urban development.

Some 27.6 per cent (SEK 3,184,409 thousand) were not allocated to any specific region or country. Of these funds, 19.8 per cent (SEK 631,584 thousand) were targeted towards social sectors and 12.9 per cent (SEK 411,761 thousand) towards sectors in the field of natural resources.

Sida is working in four main sectors, Human rights & democratic gover-

nance; Social sectors; Infrastructure, trade & industry and urban development; and Natural resources.

Some 18.4 per cent (SEK 2,111,913 thousand) were allocated to the sector *Human rights & democratic governance*. Contributions are provided for Human rights; the Legal system; Democracy; Public administration; Promotion of peace and conflict management; and Other aspects of human rights and democratic governance.


Projects in *Social sectors*, i.e. Education; Health care; Population issues; Culture etc received 23.1 per cent (SEK 2,670,733 thousand) of the funds.

Some 22.1 per cent (SEK 2,552,920 thousand) of the funds were allocated to Transport; Telecommunications, IT and postal communications; Energy; Water supply and sanitation; Housing; Trade & industry; Financial sector etc which make up the *Infrastructure*, trade & industry and urban development sector.

Projects in the area of *Natural resources* (land, water, pollution and environmental protection) received 11.4 per cent (SEK 1,309,538 thousand).

Some 25.0 per cent (SEK 2,886,303 thousand) were not allocated to any specific sector.

Sida's disbursements increased in 2001 by almost SEK 2 billion to SEK 11,537,407 thousand. Approximately half of the disbursements were made to 25 of Sida's partner countries (18 in 2000 and 19 in 1999).

The largest proportion of Sida's development co-operation funds is allocated to Africa and it is natural therefore that Sida's largest partner countries are African. Tanzania and Mozambique are by far the largest partner countries. Together they received 8.1 per cent (SEK 928,714 thousand) of Sida's funds, corresponding to 26.2 per cent of the funds allocated to Africa.

Disbursements to Latin America have decreased after earlier increase as a consequence of the contributions for reconstruction after the hurricane Mitch. Honduras and Nicaragua are the two largest partner countries in this region and received 4.8 per cent (SEK 558,897 thousand) of Sida's funds, which is 38.9 per cent of the disbursements to Latin America.

Viet Nam has the leading position among the Asian countries, followed by Bangladesh. Together they received 5.7 per cent (SEK 653,965 thousand) of

Sida's funds, which is 26.4 per cent of the disbursements to Asia.

The two largest partner countries in Europe are Yugoslavia and Bosnia & Herzegovina. Some 5.7 per cent (SEK 661,447 thousand) of the funds were allocated to these countries. This represents 74.3 per cent of the funds to European countries.

Development co-operation by country and sector over the years

The disbursements made by Sida decreased in the first years of the period 1997 to 2001. The lowest point was in 1998 with disbursements amounting to SEK 6.9 billion. The decrease was partly due to a ceiling placed on disbursements by the Swedish government. In 1999–2001 the disbursements increased to SEK 11.5 billion and over the entire period there has been an increase in disbursements of 51.9 per cent (SEK 3.9 billion).

Disbursements to Africa increased during the period by SEK 0.4 billion, though the share to Africa decreased from 41.4 per cent to 30.7 per cent. Disbursements to Asia increased by almost SEK 0.6 billion but also here the proportion of funding decreased slightly, from 24.5 per cent to 21.5 per cent. Funding to Latin America increased by almost SEK 0.6 billion, and an increase of the share from 11.5 per cent to 12.5 per cent. Europe had a large increase during the period of almost SEK 0.6 billion, which resulted in an increase of the share from 4.3 per cent to 7.7 per cent.

DIAGRAM 3: SIDA'S DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION BY REGION 1997-2001



Disbursements to the main sector Human rights and democratic governance have increased by almost SEK 0.7 billion since 1998, but the proportion of disbursements to the main sector decreased from 21.3 per cent to 18.4 per cent. An increase in disbursements occurred in the Social sectors, but the share decreased from 32.8 per cent to 23.2 per cent. Infrastructure, trade & industry, and urban development more than doubled (an increase of SEK 1.3 billion) during the period, and the share increased from 18.0 per cent to 22.1 per cent. An increase (SEK 0.4 billion) in disbursements occurred in the main sector Natural resources but its share decreased from 13.8 per cent to 11.4 per cent.

DIAGRAM 4: SIDA'S DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION BY SUB-SECTOR 1998-2001






Development co-operation by type of assistance

Sida has ten types of assistance, Project support, Sector programme support, Technical co-operation, International training programmes, Credits, Guarantees, Economic reforms, Humanitarian assistance, Research and Contributions to NGOs.

Project support is the largest type (44.9 per cent) and includes Institutional development; Investments; Information; Strategies & studies; Evaluation & audits; and Elections & secondment of personnel. As its name suggests, it is one or several projects that are in focus here and these projects are often owned by the partner country or NGO. Sida's role in these projects is that of controller.

Sector programme support is a fairly new type of support and it is growing. In 2001 Sida allocated 4.5 per cent of the funds to sector programme support. It requires greater involvement on the part of the partner country. Several donors can contribute budget funds to a sector. The partner country often has a sector policy and coordinates the assistance within the framework of the sector policy.

Credits are only the type of assistance in 6.6 per cent of the contributions. There are different types of credits, two of which are concessionary credits and microfinancing.

Concessionary credits consist of funds borrowed on international capital markets that are combined with funds from the Swedish international aid budget and extended on soft terms. The funding for the scheme is arranged by the Swedish Export Credit Corporation (SEK) and the lending is guaranteed by the Swedish Export Credits Guarantee Board (EKN) on behalf of Sida. Sida provides the grant component with funds from the Swedish development cooperation budget.

Micro-finance is the term used to refer to different methods for giving poor people access to financial services. Sida is contributing to international efforts to develop methods and techniques for micro-financing and to disseminate these so-called "best practices" to organisations and banks that work with micro-finance, both in Sweden and in developing countries. Sida's vision is that the micro-finance sector shall be gradually integrated into the formal financial sector and be subject to supervision by the national financial supervisory authorities.

Economic reforms (Balance of payments support, Debt relief and Budget support) account for 4.3 per cent of Sida's contributions. This support shall focus on poor and indebted countries that are implementing economic reform programmes with poverty alleviation as a clear objective. The countries have to demonstrate their intentions to improve respect for human rights and to promote democratic governance. The agreements on support for economic reforms normally have a duration of one year. If Sida's partner countries show that they are making considerable efforts in respect of economic reforms and poverty alleviation, Sida can consider longer commitments.

The remaining types of assistance will be presented in the following sections.

Technical co-operation and international training programmes

Sida distinguishes between two types of technical co-operation: Contract-financed technical co-operation and other technical co-operation. In 2001, 3.5

per cent (SEK 403,390 thousand) of Sida's disbursements were for technical cooperation.

Contract-financed technical co-operation accounts for 1.4 per cent (SEK 160,191 thousand) of Sida's disbursements. The objective of contract-financed technical co-operation is to promote human resource development in low and middle-income countries and to supply know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for


the development of partner countries. It is intended that programmes of contract-financed technical co-operation should increase exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a wide range of Swedish organisations and institutions to participate in the programmes. The programmes of co-operation focus on areas in which Swedish competitiveness and know-how are strong: primarily the environment, public administration, energy, forestry, industry, transport and telecommunications sectors.

International training programmes account for 1.5 per cent (SEK 176,829 thousand) of Sida's funds. The aim is to promote human resource development in low and middle-income countries by providing know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for the development of partner countries. The programmes have the aim of promoting an increase in exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a broad spectrum of Swedish participation. It is intended that training programme participants shall have direct use of the knowledge they acquire in the training programmes in their working situation. The training programmes are normally arranged in Sweden but follow-up seminars can also be held in the participants' home countries.



Humanitarian assistance

Swedish humanitarian assistance has the objective of alleviating the consequences of natural disasters and armed conflicts for those affected. Priority is given to countries that lack resources of their own to mitigate the effects. Sida works on the basis of the needs of those affected and utilises local capacity as well as the skills of the organisations implementing the projects.

Humanitarian assistance accounts for 13.8 per cent of Sida's development co-operation. It is mostly given in situations of conflict (64.0 per cent of the humanitarian assistance), which lead to tragic interruptions in the normal lives of people. The political objectives of Swedish development co-operation also govern humanitarian assistance as far as possible. Long-term development effects are taken into consideration in the planning of the projects, which, in

addition to emergency relief, can have the character of both prevention and rehabilitation. In emergency situations, for example where refugees are involved, humanitarian aspects must be allowed to govern the planning and organisation of the projects.

Humanitarian assistance is administered through grants to Swedish non-governmental organisations (NGOS), international organisations and UN bodies, as well as directly through Swedish agencies and consultants.

Prevention – Contributions to decrease vulnerability and increase preparedness for natural disasters, and to activities that promote communication between groups in conflict and/or to provide security for them and for innocent civilians.

Emergency assistance – Contributions of humanitarian assistance to victims of disasters and conflicts.

Reconstruction – Contributions to social reconstruction after natural disasters and conflicts.

Other – Contributions connected to natural disasters and conflicts that do not fall under the other headings.

Research

The objective of research co-operation is to support research that is of significance for development in developing countries. This is done by providing support to improve the capacity of developing countries to run research programmes of their own and by providing support to research that can contribute to the solution of important development problems. Research co-operation accounted for 7.2 per cent (SEK 828,694 thousand) of Sida's development co-operation in 2001.

Swedish international development co-operation has used a model for research co-operation that has proved to be successful. It is based on co-operation between institutions in a developing country and institutions in an industrial country, primarily Sweden. Programmes of scientific co-operation, as well as research training leading to research degrees for students from Sida's partner countries, are run on the basis of projects jointly formulated by the Swedish and the partner countries' institutions. These programmes combine work at the home institution in a partner country with research studies at the Swedish partner institution.

Bilateral research co-operation.

Approximately one-forth of Sida's appropriation for research co-operation is allocated to bilateral co-operation with developing countries, primarily to develop national research capacity. At present there are programmes of research co-operation with the following countries: Tanzania, Mozambique, Ethiopia, Eritrea, Burkino-Faso, Uganda, Sri Lanka, Vietnam, Bolivia and Nicaragua.

Regional research programmes.

This type of support has the aim of stimulating co-operation between the participating countries in research areas of common interest. Sida is supporting regional research networks in Africa, Latin America and Asia that focus, for example, on social sciences, energy, biological diversity and biotechnology.

Special programmes and initiatives.

Sida supports research in important areas that require special attention. Several special projects are linked to the four action programmes that guide Sida's international development co-operation: sustainable development, poverty alleviation, gender equality, and peace, democracy and human rights.

International research programmes.

These are primarily research programmes run under the auspices of the World Health Organization (who), and the Consultative Group for International Agricultural Research (CGIAR).

Sida's Research Council.

Researchers in Swedish institutions can apply each year for grants for research into problems of relevance to developing countries. Here Sida functions as a research council and five scientific reference groups are attached to Sida for the assessment of applications. One important objective is to give Swedish researchers the possibility to study development problems and thereby to establish and strengthen development research at Swedish universities.

DIAGRAM 8: SIDA'S RESEARCH CO-OPERATION BY TYPE 1998-2001





DIAGRAM 9: SIDA'S RESEARCH CO-OPERATION BY MAIN SECTOR 1998-2001



Between 1998 and 2001 Sida's research co-operation, as a share of total disbursements, decreased slightly from 8.0 per cent to 7.2 per cent, but actual disbursements increased from SEK 547,252 thousand to SEK 828,694 thousand. The proportions for the different types of research remained constant during the period.

Contributions to non-governmental organisations

Over 300 Swedish NGOS are active in international development co-operation. Their activities, which include approximately 2000 projects in more than 100 different countries, cover a large number of different areas. Some organisations, together with their partners, work to influence normative issues such as human rights or children's rights. Others work together with local organisations that provide direct support to specially vulnerable or marginalized target groups in the form, for example, of health care or educational facilities. Many organisations combine both functions. Common to all these inputs is that they are implemented in co-operation with local partners in partner countries.

The so-called project grants are one of the foundations of Sida's co-operation with Swedish NGOs. They permit the organisations to run activities for which they receive grants from Sida. The main rule is that the NGO must contribute 20 per cent of the total amount of the project.

Today project grants are channelled through 12 so-called frame organisa-

tions. These organisations administer the applications for grants from organisations under them and present these to Sida for approval. The 12 frame organisations are:

- Africa Groups of Sweden
- Diakonia, Sweden
- Forum Syd
- LO/TCO Council of International Trade Union Cooperation
- Olof Palme International Center, OPIC
- PMU Interlife
- · Swedish Save the Children
- Swedish Co-operative Centre, scc

- Swedish Organisation of Handicapped International Aid, SHIA
- Swedish Missionary Council, SMR
- Training for Development Assistance, UBV

The frame organisations also receive information grants from Sida for their information projects in Sweden. These projects are intended to improve understanding of development and stimulate opinion in issues related to development and development co-operation.

Contributions to NGOS account for 13.6 per cent (SEK 1,572,828 thousand) of Sida's disbursements. In addition to this, other types of assistance also use NGOS as a channel for the funds: SEK 1,557,230 thousand in 2001.



The total disbursements channelled via Ngos increased from Sek 2,370,551 thousand to Sek 3,130,058 thousand in 2001. Their share of Sida's total disbursements decreased from 34.5 per cent to 27.1 per cent. Funds channelled via international Ngos increased, from 8.5 per cent to 25.4 per cent of the funds channelled via Ngos, as did the funds channelled via partner country Ngos, from 6.9 per cent in 1998 to 12.2 per cent in 2001. Funds channelled via Swedish Ngos decreased from 67.4 per cent in 1998 to 53.5 per cent in 2001. Also other Ngos received a smaller share of the funds channelled via Ngos, from 17.2 per cent in 1998 to 8.9 per cent in 2001.

Sida's four action programmes

Sida has established action programmes in pivotal areas of international development co-operation: poverty reduction; peace, democracy & human rights; gender equality; and environment & sustainable development.

Country strategies and the four action programmes form the background on

which the selection of inputs in each individual country and the concentration of operations to central sectors or problem areas are based. Sida plans new activities jointly with each partner country.

The figures presented under these headings are an indication of the proportion of Sida's contributions that can be considered to be within the scope of a particular action programme.

Poverty alleviation

Reducing poverty is the overriding goal of all Sida's international development co-operation. Sida's point of departure is that the governments of partner countries are responsible for reducing poverty and for sustainable development. The programme states how Sida can support the efforts and improve the capacity of the partner countries. In countries where poverty alleviation is not given priority by the government, the main part of Sida's support shall be directed to programmes that provide direct benefits for the poor, mainly through non-governmental channels.

Economic growth is a prerequisite for the sustainable reduction of poverty. There are no examples in which mass poverty has been eliminated without the aid of strong economic growth. But economic growth in itself is not sufficient. It must be part of a deliberate overall policy for poverty alleviation.

Sida's main task is to support the type of growth that leads to a sustainable alleviation of poverty.

Sida distinguishes between four categories of poverty alleviation projects and programmes:


Direct effect – Usually targeted projects and sector support aimed directly at local communities with poor groups of people.

Projects and programmes in which poor groups are included – Programmes or projects which reach several social categories including the poor, e g support to primary education and primary health care, which is targeted at the total population in an area but includes poor groups as well.

Indirect effect through policies and institutions — Projects or programmes which promote equitable growth-oriented policies, macro-economic stability and reforms, which include improvements for poor groups by removing systemic constraints at national and international levels. Examples of such projects are legislation and institution building which promote economic and social growth and democratic governance; tax reforms; and macro-economic reforms which stimulate growth and increase revenues and which may lead to employment opportunities for the poor.

Support at national level, which indirectly affects poverty alleviation — Projects which stimulate the growth of resources and employment opportunities and which preserve natural resources. This group includes balance of payments support and debt relief, investments in infrastructure (including transport, telecommunications and energy), trade and industry and projects for the preservation of natural resources.

Between 1998 and 2001 about 90 per cent of Sida's development co-operation had an effect on poverty alleviation. Examples of projects that have been classified as Other are internal Sida studies in a particular area or methods development projects. In the long-term these can also have an effect on poverty alleviation; during the period 1998 to 2000 they remained constant at around 11 per cent and decreased to 9.7 per cent in 2001. During 1998 to 2001 projects with a "direct effect" decreased slightly, from 16.6 per cent in 1998 to 16.5 per cent in 2001. Projects with "indirect effect through policies and institutions" increased from 31.8 per cent in 1998 to 39.8 per cent in 2001. "Projects and pro-

grammes in which poor groups are included" decreased from 27.5 per cent in 1998 to 17.3 per cent in 2001. Sida increased its "support to national level which indirectly affects poverty alleviation" from 13.3 per cent in 1998 to 16.7 per cent in 2001.

Peace, democracy and human rights

Democratic development also provides a good – though insufficient – foundation on which to build a society based on equality and to give people the opportunity to participate in development. Government institutions, and a civil society that functions effectively, are of fundamental importance for the consolidation of democracy.


Democratic development and respect for human rights provide basic instruments to achieve peaceful solutions to conflicts and to prevent armed conflicts.

Sida considers that the fulfilment of certain minimum requirements is essential for democratic governance: free elections including the possibility to choose between alternative candidates; an independent legal system; and respect for fundamental democratic rights and privileges.

Principal objective — The strengthening of peace, democracy and human rights is the primary objective of these operations. The project is expected to promote democratic processes or strengthen respect for human rights. Material will be produced on project goals and on the activities relevant to the strengthening of peace, democracy and human rights.

Significant objective — One of the project objectives is to strengthen peace, democracy and human rights. Material will be produced on project activities, relevant to the strengthening of peace, democracy and human rights.

In 1998 69.8 per cent of the projects had either a principal or significant peace, democracy and human rights objective. This increased to 71.3 per cent in 2001. Projects with peace, democracy and human rights as the principal objective have remained constant, at around 20 per cent during 1998–2000 but increased to 21.3 in 2001. Projects with peace, democracy and human rights as a significant objective decreased from 50.0 per cent in 1998 to 41.6 per cent in 2000 but are now back at 50.0 per cent in 2001.

Gender equality

World poverty is increasingly depicted by the face of a woman. In many countries women are not allowed to own land and other assets. They also have a weaker financial position than men in the family, the local community, the nation and internationally, at the same time as they have limited opportunities of participating in the decisions which affect their situation. Violence against women is increasing and women in particular are seriously affected by armed conflicts.

Equality between women and men is a human rights issue and a prerequisite for sustainable development.

Sida gives priority to measures that promote the human rights and economic independence of women and equality where participation in political and economic decision-making processes is concerned.

Principal objective – Promotion of equality between women and men is the primary objective of the project. An analysis of the situation of women and men is part of the project. Two of the criteria listed below have been fulfilled.


Significant objective – Promotion of equality between women and men is one of the project objectives. An analysis of the situation of women and men has been made and two of the criteria listed below have been fulfilled.

Criteria

- Strategies and implementation plans are based on the gender equality perspective and its consequences
- Specific measures have been taken to deal with existing constraints on the full and equal participation of women
- Specific measures have been taken to secure equal control over the outcomes of the project by both women and men
- Indicators have been developed or will be developed for monitoring and evaluation which will make it possible to measure results from a gender equality perspective

- Gender equality specialists have been utilised in the design phase and will be utilised in the implementation and follow up phases and/or gender equality training has been offered/is planned
- Consultations have been held with both women and men

In 1998 the proportion of projects in which gender equality was a principal or significant equality objective was 63.2 per cent. This increased to 67.1 per cent in 2001. The proportion of projects in which gender equality was the principal objective remained constant at around 7 per cent while the proportion of projects in which gender equality was a significant objective increased from 56.2 per cent to 61.0 per cent.

Environment and sustainable development


Environmental aspects shall be integrated into all Sida's development co-operation programmes in accordance with the undertakings ensuing from Sweden's accession to Agenda 21 and other international environmental conventions. All projects are assessed on the basis of their effect on the environment.

Sida gives priority to supporting the management of scarce water resources; agriculture and forestry/soil conservation; the marine environment; the urban environment; and environment-friendly consumption and production of energy.

Principal objective — The project shall protect or improve the physical and/or biological environment, promote the sustainable management of natural resources, decrease existing levels of environmental degradation and contain specific measures for the development or strengthening of environmental policies, legislation, capacity, public administration or other organisations/ instruments for the preservation of the environment.

Significant objective — One of the project's objectives is to protect or improve the physical and/or biological environment.

In 2001 the proportion of projects in which the environment and sustainable development was a principal or a significant objective was 58.6 per cent, an increase from 49.7 per cent in 1998. The proportion of projects in which it was a principal objective decreased from 13.5 per cent in 1998 to 11.8 per cent in 2001 and the proportion in which it was a significant objective increased from 36.3 per cent to 46.8 per cent.

Sida's Co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe

Most countries in Central and Eastern Europe are in a process of transition from dictatorships to democracy and from planned economies to market economies. Initially the standard of living of large groups in some of these countries has declined. In several cases average life expectancy has also diminished substantially. In other countries the transition has been implemented with great rapidity and success. A closer relationship with the EU is a key issue for the region.

Sida's co-operation aims at promoting the process of transition through support to political, economic and social reforms, co-operation with neighbouring countries in respect of the environment, energy, and equality, and support for integration with the EU.

Co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe by country and goal

The Swedish Parliament has established four specific goals for co-operation with countries in Central and Eastern Europe:

- Promote common security
- Deepen the culture of democracy
- Support socially sustainable economic transition
- Support environmentally sustainable development

Each country has its own distinctive character and the potential for development varies considerably from country to country. Sida makes proposals for country strategies, which shall be approved by the Government, for the most important partner countries. These strategies are the most important instrument to guide co-operation at country level. The objectives of the support and the selection of sectors, programmes and projects are determined on the basis

of an overall assessment. This holistic approach also determines the scope of co-operation, the time frame, forms of financing and participants.

Disbursements 2001

SEK 694,279 thousand (administrative costs included) was allocated to Central and Eastern Europe in 2001.

Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Ukraine and Russia (primarily northwest Russia and Barents region) have been given priority by the Swedish government. Some two-thirds (SEK 489,998 thousand) of the disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe were allocated to the countries given priority.

Some 5.2 per cent (Sek 36,148 thousand) of the funds were allocated to *Estonia*. A main task for Sida is to facilitate Estonia's integration into the European Union. Some 15.2 per cent (Sek 5,505 thousand) were allocated to deepening the culture of democracy, 9.1 per cent (Sek 3,297 thousand) to the promotion of private enterprise and 52.8 per cent (Sek 19,071 thousand) to environmentally sustainable development.

Latvia received 7.0 per cent (SEK 48,759 thousand) of the funds. Sida works with the necessary transition of the economic and political systems. Integration into the European Union is also in focus. Some 42.2 per cent (SEK 20,591 thousand) were allocated to environmentally sustainable development and 16.3 per cent (SEK 7,970 thousand) were allocated to projects supporting the social sectors.

Some 7.7 per cent (SEK 53,374 thousand) of the funds were allocated to *Lithuania*. Environment and energy and the integration into the European Union are areas given priority by Sida. Some 41.9 per cent (SEK 22,383 thousand) of the funds were allocated to the social sectors and 15.7 per cent (SEK 8,363 thousand) to environmentally sustainable development.

Poland's share of the funds was 4.0 per cent (SEK 27,867 thousand) in 2001. The development of democracy and a market economy is the essential objective of Sida's support. Some 69.7 per cent (SEK 19,415 thousand) were allocated to environmentally sustainable development projects and 9.7 per cent (SEK 2,713,000) to the promotion of private enterprise.

Some 34.3 per cent (SEK 237,841 thousand) of the funds for Central and Eastern Europe were allocated to *Russia*. The priorities of Sida's co-operation with Russia are support to reforms and Russia's integration into the European Union. Some 21.2 per cent (SEK 50,374 thousand) of the funds for Russia financed projects promoting private enterprise, 16.0 per cent (SEK 38,049 thousand) financed social sectors and 15.3 per cent (SEK 36,316 thousand) the deepening the culture of democracy.

Ukraine received 7.7 per cent (SEK 53,616 thousand) of the funds for Central and Eastern Europe. Sida works to promote further development towards democracy and a market economy. Another important area is to work for environmental sustainable development. Some 32.5 per cent (SEK 17,449 thousand) were allocated for this purpose in 2001. In addition 37.0 per cent (SEK 19,852 thousand) were allocated to the promotion of private enterprise and 22.1 per cent (SEK 10,113 thousand) to deepening the culture of democracy.

Some 29.4 per cent (SEK 204,282 thousand) were allocated to other countries. Of these funds, 23.4 per cent (SEK 47,867 thousand) were allocated to deepening of the culture of democracy and 21.6 per cent (SEK 44,147 thousand) to social sectors.

Sida disbursed 52.3 per cent (SEK 362,842 thousand) to projects for socially sustainable economic transition, 26.8 per cent (SEK 185,896 thousand) to support environmentally sustainable development, 16.9 per cent (SEK 117,668 thousand) to deepen the culture of democracy and 4.0 per cent (SEK 27,873 thousand) to promote common security.

DIAGRAM 15: CO-OPERATION WITH CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE BY COUNTRY 2001




DIAGRAM 16: CO-OPERATION WITH CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE BY GOAL 2001



Co-operation by country and goal over the years

In the period 1998 to 2001 disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe increased by 27.4 per cent, from SEK 545,103 thousand to SEK 694,279 thousand.

Disbursements to Russia increased from 18.9 per cent (SEK 103,160 thousand) in 1998 to 34.3 per cent (SEK 237,841 thousand). Ukraine increased its share, from 2.8 per cent (SEK 15,274 thousand) in 1998 to 7.7 per cent (SEK 53,616 thousand) in 2001. Where all other countries given priority are concerned, disbursements decreased: in Latvia from 11.8 per cent (SEK 64,486 thousand) to 7.0 per cent (SEK 48,759 thousand) and Poland from 13.0 per cent (SEK 70,629 thousand) to 4.0 per cent (SEK 27,867 thousand).



Disbursements to the objective "Socially sustainable development" increased, from 44.6 per cent (SEK 242,894 thousand) to 52.3 per cent (SEK 362,842 thousand). Disbursements to the objectives "Deepening the culture of democracy" and "Promotion of common security" also increased, from 13.2 per cent (SEK 71,974 thousand) to 16.9 per cent (SEK 117,668 thousand) and from 0 to 4.0 per cent (SEK 27,873 thousand), respectively. Disbursements to "Environmentally sustainable development" fell from 42.2 per cent (SEK 230,235 thousand) to 26.8 per cent (SEK 185,896 thousand).

DIAGRAM 18: SIDA'S CO-OPERATION WITH CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE BY GOAL 1998-2001



Co-operation by type of assistance

Sida focuses its support to make it correspond to the efforts, reality and development needs of each individual country.


Sida's ten types of assistance also apply to co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe. The types are Project support, Sector programme support, Technical co-operation, International training programmes, Credits, Guarantees, Economic reforms, Humanitarian assistance, Research and Contributions to NGOS.

For more information on the types on assistance see the section above in this booklet.

Project support accounted for 17.7 per cent. Sector programme support is a fairly new type of support and it is growing. In 2001 Sida disbursed 2.1 per cent of the funds to Central and Eastern Europe with this type of assistance. Credits were only the type of assistance in 0.8 per cent of the contributions. Some 3.4 per cent of the funds to Central and Eastern Europe were Humanitarian assistance. No funds or only very small amounts were allocated to Economic reforms and Guarantees.

The other types of assistance are presented in the following sections.

Technical co-operation and international training programmes

Sida distinguishes between two types of technical co-operation, Contract-financed technical co-operation and other technical co-operation. In 2001 56.2 per cent (SEK 391,832 thousand) of Sida's disbursements to Central and East-ern Europe were in the form of technical co-operation.

Contract-financed technical co-operation accounts for 37.5 per cent (SEK 260,506 thousand) of Sida's disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe. The objective of contract-financed technical co-operation is to promote human resource development in low and middle-income countries and to supply know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for the development of partner countries. Programmes of contract-financed technical co-operation shall promote exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a wide range of Swedish organisations and institutions to participate

in the programmes. The programmes of co-operation focus on areas in which Swedish competitiveness and know-how are strong: primarily the environment, public administration, energy, forestry, industry, transport and telecommunications sectors.


Some 1.8 per cent (SEK 12,298 thousand) of Sida's funds to Central and Eastern Europe were used for *International training programmes*. The aim is to promote human resource development in low and middle-income countries by providing know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for the development of partner countries. The international training programmes shall promote exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a broad spectrum of Swedish participation. It is intended that training programme participants shall have direct use of the knowledge they acquire in the training programmes in their working situation. The training programmes are normally arranged in Sweden but follow-up seminars can also be held in the participants' home countries.

Sida's disbursements for technical co-operation and international training programmes increased from 51.0 per cent (SEK 278,053 thousand) in 1998 to 58.2 per cent (SEK 404,130 thousand) in 2001. The disbursements for Contract-financed technical co-operation increased by 100.9 per cent from 1998 to 2001. Disbursements for Other technical co-operation decreased by 6.1 per cent. Disbursements for International training programmes increased by 44.7 per cent during the same period.

Contributions to non-governmental organisations

The so-called project grants are one of the foundations of Sida's co-operation with Swedish NGOs. They permit the organisations to run activities for which they receive grants from Sida. The main rule is that the NGO must contribute 20 per cent of the total amount of the project.

Today project grants are channelled through 10 so-called frame organisations. These organisations administer the applications for grants from organisations under them and present these to Sida for approval. The 10 frame organisations are:



The disbursements channelled via NGOS increased from 14.5 per cent (SEK 78,788 thousand) in 1998 to 17.4 per cent (SEK 120,941 thousand) in 2001. Funds channelled via international NGOS increased from 0 to 21.6 per cent of the funds channelled via NGOS. The funds channelled via Swedish NGOS decreased from 86.3 per cent in 1998 to 78.3 per cent in 2001. Funds channelled via other NGOS decreased from 13.7 per cent in 1998 to 0 in 2001.

Quality and comparisons

General

The information in this publication concerns Sida's development co-operation and co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe, both multilateral and bilateral, in 2001.

All amounts show net disbursements, i.e. amounts paid out minus any repaid amounts (unutilised funds remaining after completion of project or programme which are repaid to the donor), in SEK thousands, current prices.

The figures are obtained from Sida's financial administration and planning system, plus, where officers enter statistics relevant to their inputs. The statistics constitute a large part of the report on Sweden's statistics made by Sida to the oecd's Development Assistance Committee (dag). To make international statistics in this area comparable between donor countries, definitions and directives are written and agreed upon by the member countries of Oecd/dag. Sida makes considerable efforts to make its statistics comparable and correct.

No consideration has been taken of the appropriation accounts. The breakdown between development co-operation and co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe is based on the countries.

The development co-operation administration is not shown in this publication, except in Appendix 1. Appropriation accounts.

Comparisons with other publications

Sida's annual report

Sida's annual report shows costs while this publication shows disbursements. The distinction between costs and disbursements concerns accounting techniques. Costs are the sum of the invoices registered during the period of one year. Costs become disbursements only when the invoice has been paid i.e. an invoice may be registered during 2001 but disbursement is not made until 2002.

The operational areas shown in the annual report do not correspond to the sectors presented here.

Statistical report 2000

Some differences in the aggregated figures on regional totals occur since, in this publication, we have changed the regions to correspond with Sidas organisation.

Statistical yearbook 2000

The Statistical Yearbook shows Sweden's development co-operation and cooperation with Central and Eastern Europe in 2000 in which Sida is only one of the many parties involved.

Appendices

1. Appropriation accounts (From Annual Report, Sida 2001)

The *opening amounts* refer to the funds that have been transferred from the savings made in previous years on extended appropriations or framework appropriations.

A committed appropriation is a binding commitment, i.e. signed agreement/contract or decision to make the contribution, less the disbursements made during the year in question for sub-item where it is evident from financing decision that the funds shall be used for the year in question (2001).
