Sida's Evaluation Plan 2005

1 Sida's Evaluation Activities

Evaluation has by tradition constituted an integral and important part of Swedish development cooperation. The main purposes of Sida's evaluations are to strengthen learning and performance among the actors involved in Swedish development co-operation and to provide information to the general public and government bodies about the results of Swedish development co-operation through Sida.

In December of 2003 Swedish Parliament decided on a comprehensive and coherent Swedish policy for global development. The decision involves an increased emphasis on accountability for the results of the new policy. In line with this a new independent function for evaluation of development cooperation is to be established 2005. According to the underlying Government Bill the existing evaluation functions are to continue as each organisation charged with executing the new policy will be responsible for evaluation activities within its own remit. The new institute is supposed to engage in a wide range of activities spanning from audit work to research endeavours. A guiding principle, however, is that the activities of the new institute should complement those already undertaken by Sida.

Sida's evaluation system has two constituent parts. According to Sida policy each embassy and Sida department evaluates project and programme performance within its own area of operational responsibility. The Department for Evaluation and Internal Audit (UTV) is responsible for thematic and more comprehensive evaluations of strategic relevance to development co-operation through Sida. The present Evaluation Plan covers all evaluations to be completed, ongoing or initiated by Sida during 2005.

UTV's evaluation plan and the evaluation plans of the units of operative responsibility are schematically presented in *Annexes 1* and *2* respectively. For a more detailed account of the goals, organisation and working methods of Sida's evaluation system, the reader is referred to Sida's *Evaluation Policy* approved by Sida's Board of Directors in September 1999.

2 Departmental Evaluation Plans

The departmental evaluation plans for 2005 include 115 evaluations. Some of the information submitted is incomplete, but the following may be said:

- Almost half of the evaluations will be carried out in accordance with prior project agreements.
- Approximately three-fourths of the evaluations concern projects that have previously not been evaluated by Sida.
- Sida is responsible for the majority of the planned evaluations. Only in a few cases will the evaluation be undertaken in co-operation with other donors.

- 17% of the planned evaluations are interim evaluations of ongoing projects rather than evaluations
 of completed projects. As such, they are likely to be more concerned with project implementation
 and achievement of intermediary goals than with development impacts.
- Among the stated reasons for evaluation, needs for information relevant to a decision concerning continued support (25%), and a need for information for fine-tuning of the evaluated project (22%), are the most common.

The departmental evaluation plans for 2004 covered 113 evaluations. At the end of that year, a total of 35 evaluations had been completed (including 7 evaluations not listed in the plan), 37 were ongoing, 20 had been postponed, and 28 had been removed from the plan. A more detailed examination of the implementation of the departmental plans can be found in UTV's *Annual Report* to the Board.

3 The Department for Evaluation and Internal Audit

UTV is an independent department reporting to Sida's Board of Directors that also decides on UTV's evaluation plan. The evaluation reports produced by UTV are presented to Sida's Director General who will decide on a Management Response before the evaluation is eventually presented to Sida's Board of Directors. The budget allocation to UTV, both the administrative budget and the allocation from the account for Bilateral Development Co-operation are decided by the Director General.

3.1 Mandate and Tasks

UTV is mandated to carry out comprehensive and/or thematic evaluations of strategic importance to Swedish development assistance. All development co-operation funded or co-funded by Sida, as well as Sida's organisation, may be examined by UTV. As a rule, UTV evaluations do not focus on individual projects, unless they involve issues of broader interest to Swedish development co-operation.

In addition to carrying out evaluations on its own, or in co-operation with other donor organisations and partner countries, UTV gives support to the evaluation activities of Sida's operative departments, both through project support – advising on individual evaluation projects – and organisational support – support in establishing and following up evaluation plans, training programmes, etc. UTV is also responsible for documentation and information in the field of evaluation. In addition UTV staff contributes to Sida Management Board, the central Project Committee etc.

In balancing these different tasks, UTV is currently giving most weight to its "own" evaluations while engagement in various joint international evaluation undertakings will constitute an increasing share of UTV's project engagements. In view of Sida's Field Vision, as well as the current harmonisation and alignment processes, the allocation of UTV staff resources might shift more towards joint evaluations and support to evaluation activities.

The implementation of the Evaluation Plan is reviewed by UTV every year as part of UTV's *Annual Report* to the Board.

3.2 Work Methods

Whereas evaluations serve the purpose of both learning and accountability, UTV has recognised that it is necessary to adopt a participatory approach to evaluations in order to enhance evaluation impact.

In practice this means that relevant stakeholders are invited to discuss the evaluation at different stages of the evaluation process. Although the subject matter and object of the evaluation is decided by Sida's Board of Directors, UTV has the final responsibility for the Terms of Reference and the actual evaluation is normally carried out by independent external consultants. The intended users of the evaluation are invariably invited to contribute to the process. In a typical evaluation there will be a consultation process regarding the Terms of Reference, stakeholders may be invited to comment on the work of the consultants at various stages and open seminars are arranged for discussion and dissemination of evaluation findings. Although this has become a standard mode of operation the participation of different stakeholders in the evaluation process may still be developed.

UTV takes on different roles and responsibilities in current joint evaluation projects, from assuming a lead and coordinating function, to being a speaking partner, financial contributor, and external expert.

3.3 Staff and Budget

By the end of 2004, UTV had six full-time positions as evaluation officers. In practice this means 5 1/2 positions available for evaluation as one half position is occupied by the deputy director of UTV. There is one vacant position as evaluation manager due to the reduction in administrative resources. In addition UTV has staff working with documentation and information (one full-time post) and internal administration (equivalent to two and a half posts). The staff of UTV also includes Sida's two internal auditors.

UTV's budget for administration, including staff, constitutes SEK 8.384 million for 2005. Approximately SEK 270 000 will be carried over from the year 2004. The allocation reflects a general reduction of 4 % being imposed on the administrative budgets of most Sida departments in 2005.

SEK 15 million has been allocated to UTV from the account for bilateral development co-operation to be used for procurement of external services for evaluation and internal audit in 2005.

4 UTV's Evaluation Plan

UTV has a planning horizon of two to three years. This is due both to the theme fact that a particular evaluation may involve several projects and that most evaluation projects have more than one year. The evaluation projects contained in the plan are in various stages of preparation. As a rule an evaluation project is screened by the following criteria: policy relevance, financial importance, innovativeness, replicability of the co-operation, under scrutiny, evaluability, cost-benefit, and usefulness to Sida and other stakeholders.

4.1 Looking Back - Evolving Themes and Priorities

Since its creation in 1995 UTV has explored a variety of themes and issues related to current issues in development co-operation. In review the evaluations of UTV have been less concerned with assessing long term impact than with the implementation of policies and principles, and with gauging the relevance and effectiveness of aid modalities and the processes of development co-operation. UTV has carried out several studies of the use of the evaluation instrument in Sida's work and the quality of results information in country strategies. Most evaluations have in one way or another been used in revising or formulating Sida policies and guidelines.

UTV has made various attempts to assess long term impact. Some have proven abortive on account of a lack of data. Others have been more successful. One is the large evaluation of the Bai Bang project¹, an ex-post assessment of the outcome and impact of a large and controversial project to support the construction of a pulp and paper production facility in Vietnam. Another attempt is the evaluation of Swedish Programme Aid² that addressed a wide range of issues and included the whole spectrum of programme aid modalities. The evaluation also attempted to answer the question of the impact of Swedish programme aid.

UTV has concerned itself with various aspects of *knowledge management*, assessing the use of evaluations in Sida's work³, the quality of results analysis⁴ and the incorporation of various cross-cutting issues in evaluations⁵.

Country level evaluations have used two main approaches. Two evaluations (Tanzania and Mozambique⁶) examined the process of formulating and the content of the country strategies and project portfolios for the two countries. In contrast the recent evaluations of the Swedish country programs in Laos and Vietnam⁷ focused on the implementation of the strategy and its expression in every day decisions about support to specific projects and programs.

Aid modalities have also been evaluated, notably program support as already mentioned and Contract Financed Technical Co-operation⁸. In addition, Swedish support to area based development projects has been evaluated in order to assess how they might be retooled to enhance sustainability and their contribution to reducing poverty⁹.

UTV has also evaluated the implementation of *basic principles and policies* in Swedish development cooperation ¹⁰. Ownership as a basic principle for international development co-operation has been explored in several evaluations and the findings from these were synthesised in a study ¹¹. Furthermore UTV has evaluated progress in mainstreaming gender equality into development co-operation ¹². This evaluation also gave rise to a methods study ¹³ and a joint seminar with the evaluation unit in EuropeAid.

UTV has also commissioned a study about incentives and sustainability in development co-operation¹⁴. In 2004 UTV concluded an evaluation on the relevance and implementation of Sida's policy related to support to culture and the media¹⁵

In recent years UTV has explored Sida's approach to *private sector development*¹⁶ with a number of evaluations. The last evaluation report in this series was published in 2004.

4.2 Joint Evaluations

Joint evaluations involving both donor organisations and partner countries are becoming increasingly important as a vehicle for joint learning and accountability. It is also part of the current harmonisation efforts among donors and is encouraged by the DAC Network for Development Evaluation. This trend towards increased donor co-operation and harmonisation is likely to influence evaluation planning both in the operative departments and in UTV in the years to come.

In the past UTV has actively contributed to a number of joint evaluations starting with the evaluation of the response to the genocide in Rwanda¹⁷. A joint evaluation looked at EU development cooperation with the ACP (Africa, Caribbean and the Pacific) countries. Lately UTV has participated in the World Bank led evaluation of the Comprehensive Development Framework¹⁸ and the joint evaluation on support to Basic Education¹⁹. Moreover UTV has participated in the evaluation of IFAD. In keeping with a decision by the Directors General of the so-called Nordic + group (Denmark, Finland, Norway, Sweden, the Netherlands and Ireland) some joint evaluation planning has taken place starting in 2005.

4.3 Priorities for 2005–2006

In the coming year UTV expects to continue working in the following areas:

- Knowledge management
- Policy implementation
- Pro-poor economic development
- Institutional development
- Democracy and human rights
- Peace building and humanitarian assistance
- Aid effectiveness
- Aid modalities

Several of the themes respond to current concerns in the wider development community. Most are also in line with current priorities in Swedish development co-operation as defined by Swedish Parliament and the underlying Government Bill on a new Swedish comprehensive policy for global development (2002/03:122 Shared Responsibility. Sweden's policy for global development). In particular UTV is giving priority to sectors that receive a substantial amount of co-operation funds but have not been evaluated to a large extent. This is the case for support to democracy and human rights as well as humanitarian assistance and support to peace building. It has been notoriously difficult to assess impact from support to democracy and human rights and UTV will explore new ways to tackle the difficulties in this area.

In 2005, UTV intends to carry out the evaluations and studies along the themes presented above. Several of these will be continued from Sida's Evaluation Plan 2004. In 2004 preparatory work was started in several new fields which have resulted in evaluation projects that will be initiated in 2005 and in 2006. In addition to the planned evaluations, the presentation below includes some areas which — depending on available resources — will be subject to further exploration during the coming year.

The plan contains a total of 25 evaluations and studies, of which 9 evaluation projects and 3 evaluation studies will be completed in 2005. The following new areas are included in the plan:

- Sida's response to the tsunami Catastrophe
- ODA Effectiveness
- Co-ordination/harmonisation in Zambia
- Research Co-operation

Several of the joint evaluations will be carried out within the framework of the DAC Network for Development Evaluations. Some of the evaluations are relevant with regard to more than one theme. In such cases, the evaluation is mentioned under the heading most closely related to its main purpose. An overview of the plan and the timeframe for each evaluation project are presented in *Annex 1*.

UTV is an active member of various development evaluation networks. UTV is representing Sweden in the DAC Network for Development Evaluation, which consists of the Heads of Evaluation Services (HES) of the donor organisations of the OECD member countries and certain multilateral institutions. As the Director of UTV is chair of the DAC Network as of July 2004, this will imply greater international involvement for the department as a whole. UTV is also represented in the EUHES group of the EU Commission and Member States. UTV is presently assuming a coordinating role in a joint evaluation programme, the so-called Triple C initiative. In addition UTV is an active member of the Nordic plus group.

By participating in international evaluation networks, UTV is promoting donor co-ordination in relation to evaluation standards and evaluation programming. In the interest of donor harmonisation and joint learning and accountability UTV is actively engaged in the planning and implementation of joint evaluations in areas of strategic interest to Swedish international development co-operation.

4.3.1 Knowledge Management²⁰

The desk study on *experiences from country evaluations* will continue through the first half of 2005. The purpose of the study is to provide an overview of approaches and experiences of country based evaluations and a discussion of their relevance for Swedish development assistance.

The issue of *evaluation quality* – and the potential problem of weak quality of member evaluations – has been highlighted by the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) Network on Development Evaluation. High evaluation quality is crucial for effective accountability and learning within development co-operation. In 2003, the Australian Agency for International Development took a first step towards conducting a review of the quality of DAC member evaluations and invited the other network members to participate in an evaluation. As a first step a set of minimum quality standards have been developed that will be discussed at a Workshop in New Delhi in April of 2005. The expected result of the workshop is a set of agreed minimum standards that can be used to assess the quality of evaluations of DAC member countries.

During 2004 UTV commissioned an evaluation of Sida's system for *management response* of evaluations, which is instituted to ensure that the findings and the recommendations of evaluations carried out within Sida are properly taken into account and documented by the Sida departments concerned. Umeå Centre for Evaluation Research (UCER) was commissioned to carry out the evaluation. It involves a quantitative and a qualitative document analysis of evaluation reports and management responses written since the system was introduced in 1999. Furthermore UCER interviews Sida staff as regards the relevance, effectiveness and impact of the system. The evaluation will be completed in May 2005.

4.3.2 Policy Implementation

During 2005, UTV will maintain and expand its focus on the implementation of Sida's policies. With the establishment of Sida's new Department for Policy and Methodology (POM), such questions have been given increased salience within the organisation. In this regard, UTV can contribute insights and concrete knowledge related to how internal (content and instruments

of the policy) and external (organisational and contextual) factors affect the implementation of different policies. Four different evaluations can be said to relate to such themes.

During 2004, UTV initiated an evaluation of *the implementation of Sweden's policy on HIV/AIDS* in development co-operation ("Investing for Future Generations") with a focus on Sida's aid programming and organisation in that area. So far, the evaluation has generated a replication of the 1999 baseline study, and consultants are currently performing field studies in Bangladesh, Ethiopia, Ukraine and Zambia. The final report will be delivered during the first quarter of 2005, with the results being presented at a seminar in April.

Environmentally sustainable development has been a priority for Swedish development cooperation for a long time, with the most recent policy being adopted by Sida in January 2004. Among the fundamentals of the current policy are efforts to mainstream environmental considerations into all aspects of Sida's work. During the autumn of 2004, UTV has drafted terms of reference for an evaluation of the implementation of this policy, and discussions have been held with representatives from the environmental policy unit to this effect. UTV intends to procure consultants for this evaluation in early 2005 and to conclude it before the end of the year.

Together with the gender evaluation,²¹ the two previous evaluations deal with themes that are supposed to permeate every aspect of Sida's work. An *evaluation synthesis* will draw on the insights gained from these three studies to assess the feasibility of such policies. In addition to comparing results from the three evaluations, this study will include a comparative empirical part in which key documents and activities are submitted to the same methodology in order to determine the extent to which each of these three perspectives have had an impact on them.

In addition to these evaluations, UTV will during 2005 continue its assessment of Sida's work in *the health sector*. During the autumn of 2004, UTV initiated a dialogue with Sida's health division in order to set the basis for such an evaluation. In particular, focus will be on how Sida has responded to recent changes at the levels of policy, the methods used, and the environment in which it operates (e.g., the new policy enacted in 2002, the establishment of institutions such as the Global Fund, harmonisation initiatives, etc.). In view of the complexity of the subject, it has been agreed to commission a study of these issues to be performed during the first months of 2005, which will set the basis for a subsequent evaluation.

Moreover, the area of policy evaluations includes an evaluation within the so-called *Triple C Initiative* by the EU Heads of Evaluation Services (EUHES). This group has decided to jointly undertake evaluations of the implementation of the three principles for development co-operation established by the Maastricht treaty (co-ordination, coherence, and complementarity). A program of evaluation studies has been defined and in a first phase six studies have been commissioned, each dealing with the extent to which these principles have come to characterise a particular area of European development co-operation. Sweden, through UTV, is presently chairing the Task Force created to bring this initiative forward. UTV has also agreed to act as lead agency for one of these studies, one that deals with *assistance for local development*. Austria, Belgium, France, Ireland, and the Netherlands have pledged to co-operate with Sida by contributing funds and advice to the project. During the last months of 2004, terms of reference have been prepared in consultation with partner countries, and procurement of consultants will take place in early 2005.

4.3.3 Economic Development

Economic growth is necessary, but not sufficient, in order to achieve sustainable social development and poverty reduction. Sida has in recent

years put an increased focus on economic growth, one of the eight central component elements of the Swedish government's Global Development Policy. The focus has to a large extent been on private sector development but there is also an ongoing discussion on the role of employment opportunities in the pro-poor growth process. During 2004 a work plan for the evaluation "Views on Pro-Poor Growth at Sida".

The overall purpose of the evaluation is to assess to what extent Sida staff views on pro-poor growth and employment opportunities are in line with theories and evidence from current research when it

comes to questions such as: the role of income growth and employment opportunities (in relation to other determinants) in poverty reduction, the definition of pro-poor growth, the focus on pro-poor policies and employment opportunities in the growth discussion, the main determinants of employment opportunities, economic growth in general and pro-poor economic growth, the best way to deal with these determinants, and the role of aid in the employment opportunity and pro-poor growth process. It will also map out the nature and perception of the staff's practical work with pro-poor growth and employment questions and the sources of information used in order to understand a country's growth environment.

The evaluation will assess to what extent the growth focus so far has affected the views on growth but also give a benchmark for future studies and evaluations of Sida's growth strategies or some aspect of it. The evaluation is supposed to act as a starting point in the learning process at Sida of what foster pro-poor economic growth and employment opportunities.

4.3.4 Institutional Development

It was for long assumed that poverty and underdevelopment are caused by lack of resources. Now there is a broad consensus that institutions – in terms of formal and informal rules and norms within which humans and organisations

interact and perform – play a critical role for sustainable economic and social development. According to the Swedish Policy for Global Development, contributing to increased knowledge and building sustainable institutions is at the centre of development co-operation. Similarly, Sida's Policy for Capacity Development establishes institutional development as a key component.

Developing appropriate and effective institutions is a difficult task, however, as witnessed by the experience of transition economies and reform attempts in many developing countries. Institutional change is embedded in a country's specific historical and socio-cultural context, where social, political and economic institutions – formal as well as informal – are linked into complex systems. It is therefore contextual, complex and often long term and unpredictable. Supporting institutional development is thus not only a matter of identifying the appropriate rules and norms to be established or altered, but also – and perhaps more importantly – a question of the very process of change, of "how to get there". This has implications for the role of donors. What can an external agency do to support processes of institutional development and change in partner countries that are inherently 'local' in character?

The primary purpose of the evaluation theme on institutional development is to draw lessons from Sida's experience from supporting institutional development in partner countries. A second purpose is to contribute to an increased understanding of a) the role of institutions for poverty reduction and development and thereby for all Sida-supported activities, and b) the character of processes of institutional change and the roles that donors play in promoting those. The evaluation intends to contribute to learning for Sida staff at all levels and to the development of methodological tools, policy and practice of Sida support, in order to contribute to making Swedish development co-operation more effective in promoting sustainable poverty reduction.

As a first step, an *orientation and overview* (O&O) phase was initiated in 2004.²² Its purpose is to introduce institutional concepts and perspectives to Sida staff, paint a picture of Sida's existing support for institutional development, summarise Sida's already documented experience from such support,

initiate reflection and dialogue around the evaluation theme and identify knowledge needs and central evaluation issues. The O&O phase serves both as an evaluation study and a learning phase, will be completed in 2005 and is conducted in close co-operation with Sida's operative departments and the embassies. A number of evaluation ideas will be identified and a first evaluation initiated in late 2005. Possible evaluation topics include corruption, public financial management, capacity development, democratic governance, and rule of law/the judicial system and property/land rights. A pre-study of evaluation of Sida support for institutional development within the roads and forestry sectors in Laos was completed by UTV in 2003.²³ As part of the overall evaluation theme, a possible follow-up evaluation will be discussed with the Swedish Embassy in Laos in early 2005.

4.3.5 Democratic Governance and Human Rights

In the Swedish Government bill Swedish development co-operation shall take its departure from a rights perspective according to the new policy previously mentioned. This expresses a trend in development co-operation to focus more on good governance and human rights to ensure sustainable poverty reduction. However, this is an area that is notoriously hard to evalu-

ate due to difficulties in finding suitable indicators as well as in attributing effects to individual projects in the sector²⁴. UTV has begun to explore new methods of evaluation for this sector. For 2005, four different evaluations are planned in this field, each with a different methodology and focus. Although separate projects, these four evaluations will share certain elements such as a panel of international experts and a reference group at Sida.

Three of the four planned evaluations will focus on evaluating *support to human rights*. The evaluations are independent of each other and will be carried out by different evaluation teams, but they will also complement each other.

- One will focus on the relevance and outcomes of direct support to human rights through Swedish NGOs. A number of projects will be evaluated with the intent of assessing the outcome of the interventions.
- A second evaluation will focus on the relevance and effectiveness of a large scale infrastructure project in Kenya known as Nyanza roads. Nyanza roads is a project that has attracted much attention at Sida for its comprehensive rights based approach. The project, which has been developed through a highly participatory process, is perceived as a cutting edge model for how such an approach may be implemented in practice. UTV has found the project an interesting object for a formative evaluation intended to serve as learning process both for stakeholders in the project as for Sida in general. The evaluation, which might use the outcome mapping method, will follow the implementation of the programme through 2005–2008, and produce annual reports.
- The third evaluation on the topic of human rights will focus on *dialogue* on human rights within the framework of development cooperation. It is often argued that Sida staff has an obligation to raise this topic in interaction with people in government and administration of partner countries. Dialogue issues on human rights are also often incorporated in Sida's assessment memos and in

agreements between Sida and its partner. Thus dialogue may be regarded as a cooperation modality, and as a complement to financial support in various forms. Through interviews with Sida staff and key partners UTV aims at evaluating perceptions of the relevance, effectiveness and impact of dialogue on human rights. Some preparatory work will be carried out during 2005 and the evaluation will be completed in 2006.

• Another evaluation will apply a *program theory* evaluation approach, focusing on the ideas and assumptions that form the basis for projects in the area of support to democracy. A preliminary paper discussing the possibilities of such an approach was delivered at the African Evaluation Association conference in Cape Town in December 2004. During 2005, UTV plans to proceed with a general evaluation of the ideas and theories that are manifest in the sector, sample of projects by combining certain areas in the sector (e.g. civil society support, aid to the legal sector) with a geographical choice of three to four countries. It is hoped that the findings will form the basis for a critical discussion of the reasoning on which projects in the sector are founded.

4.3.6 Peace Building and Humanitarian Assistance

The field of humanitarian assistance has increased in size during recent years due to natural disasters and armed conflicts. There is a general lack of evaluations in the area of peace building efforts and humanitarian support and UTV intends to engage in a number of evaluations in this field in the years to come. Due to the nature of support in this field, mostly

provided jointly by several donors evaluation efforts will also normally be carried out on a joint basis.

Until recently only few evaluations of humanitarian support were carried out, largely because they were considered to be too complicated and would take resources and attention from more immediate operational needs. This is changing, partly because of the increasing costs for conflict-related humanitarian assistance and partly because the situations that require humanitarian assistance often become "borderline cases" transforming into long-term development cooperation programmes.²⁵

One such evaluation looks at the support to *Afghanistan* before and particularly after the fall of the Taliban regime in 2001 when the country rapidly became a major recipient of humanitarian and eventually development support by most donors. With Danida as lead agency Sweden, together with United Kingdom, the Netherlands and Ireland, will evaluate the assistance provided during 2001–2004. A report is expected during summer 2005.

During 2003 UTV initiated an evaluation of impact, relevance and sustainability of the *Integrated Area Programmes in Bosnia-Herzegovina* (BiH). The evaluation process started with a workshop with evaluation stakeholders in Sarajevo in October 2003²⁷, and has proceeded with three empirical studies during 2004. One of the studies is anthropological and comprises four months of field work. Another is a survey, which has been answered by 3 000 programme beneficiaries. The third study scrutinises the intervention logic of the programme. All these studies will be finalised during the first half of 2005. The three studies will be published together along with a synthesis including recommendations and

lessons learned. The evaluation will be disseminated through seminars and workshops in BiH and Stockholm.

Three ideas for new evaluations will be explored by UTV during 2005. Further work will depend on the outcome of the feasibility assessment in 2005.

- One possible evaluation would concentrate on *protection* for vulnerable groups, particularly refugees, which is one of the two fundaments in humanitarian assistance; the other being relief of physical suffering (in brief, food and shelter). However, this aspect of humanitarian efforts is seldom studied and almost never evaluated on its own. There is a growing international interest to clarify the issue.
- Another strategic issue to study would be what is known as *DD* & *R* (Disarmament, Demobilisation and Reintegration) and particularly the last part the efforts to return former combatants to a normal, peaceful life. Also in this area there appears to be a lack of systematic collection of experiences.
- A third option would be the area of *peace building*, where Sweden is participating in discussions regarding possible evaluations. This is part of a joint initiative between the DAC networks on Development Evaluation and on Conflict, Peace and Development Co-operation (CPDC) and linked to the so-called Utstein initiative. During the first half of 2005 Norway will host a workshop to carry this topic further.

At the end of 2004, the worst natural disaster for decades occurred in South Asia, leaving over 150.000 dead and up to five million homeless. Sida's ability to respond in a rapid and effective manner was tested in the event. UTV will commission a study of how Sida responded to this crisis that will be carried out early in 2005.

4.3.7 Aid Effectiveness

Responding to a challenge from the OECD/DAC Chair to the aid evaluation community, Sida/UTV and its counterparts in the so-called NordicPlus group (Denmark, Finland, Ireland,

the Netherlands, Norway, and UK) decided in 2004 to consider the usefulness and feasibility of evaluating the impact of the entire aid flow to one or several countries. A concept note broadly outlining the design of such a study was favourably received at the annual meeting in November 2004 of the OECD/DAC Network for Development Co-operation Evaluation. Several member countries expressed an interest to participate in the project. However, it was agreed that more work was needed before it would be possible to decide if an evaluation of such complexity was technically and politically feasible. Sweden, supported by Denmark, the Netherlands and the OECD/DAC Secretariat, accepted to carry the project forward to a point where an informed decision about its feasibility can be made. This work will be completed during 2005. Sida/UTV has made no commitment beyond this point, but if the project turns out to be realistic continued participation would seem to be a natural option.

In 2005 the Netherlands will initiate a joint evaluation of the NordicPlus initiative to *harmonise donor policies and procedures in Zambia*. Sida/UTV will support the evaluation along with its counterparts in the other NordicPlus countries. As the harmonisation process in Zambia is still relatively recent, the evaluation will focus on processes rather than results. An approach paper outlining a possible design for the study will be discussed among the stakeholders early in the year.

4.3.8 Aid Modalities

The Joint Evaluation of *General Budget Support* (GBS) is a response to the increased financial and political importance of GBS. The evaluation is expected to yield guidance on how to tailor GBS as poverty reducing instrument.

The evaluation will comprise seven country evaluations and several thematic evaluations. A synthesis report will summarise the main findings from all the component studies of the evaluation.

Sida is taking part of this evaluation as a member of both the Steering Group (including 21 donors and 7 partner governments) and the Management Group. Sida will continue to have a leading role in this comprehensive evaluation. Draft country evaluations will be in by July 2005 and the draft synthesis is expected finalized in November. A major dissemination conference is scheduled for January 2006.

During 2004 UTV agreed to carry out a joint evaluation of *exit strategies* with the evaluation departments of Denmark, Norway and the Netherlands. An approach paper for the evaluation will be discussed among the partners in early 2005 and thereafter the study itself will follow suite. The focal issue for the evaluation is whether development initiatives are built on realistic exit strategies supportive of sustainable outcomes and whether existing strategies for exit are consistent with current models for partnership. This is an issue which figured in the latest DAC Peer Review of Swedish Development Cooperation. Planned and implemented within the NordicPlus initiative for co-ordination of evaluation work, the study will provide an input to broader debates over issues of exit, sustainability, and development co-operation relationships.

An independent external evaluation (IEE) of the *International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD)* will be completed in early 2005. On behalf of the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, Sida/UTV participates in the IEE Steering Committee and closely monitors the evaluation process. The main objective of the IEE is to determine IFAD's contribution to rural poverty reduction and the results and impact it has achieved in this area. It will also assess IFAD's corporate performance – its organisational effectiveness – and its relevance within the international development community. Completed and handed over to IFAD's Board, the evaluation will serve as an input to the negotiations around the Seventh Replenishment of IFAD's resources. As it is likely to provide lessons of wider importance for rural development, it may also prove useful to other development organisations. UTV will help disseminate the study within the Swedish development community.

SAREC's support to *research co-operation* has been an element in Swedish development co-operation for the last 30 years. Efforts have been made at reviewing this area, notably after the first ten years, and individual project evaluations have been carried out. However, after 30 years the time is ripe for assessing this co-operation modality. There are both accountability and learning reasons for an external evaluation which may be based on some or all of the five evaluation criteria; effectiveness, efficiency, impact, relevance and sustainability. UTV intends to explore approaches to an evaluation in this field during 2005, the main work on this topic is envisaged to take place in 2006.

5 Support Activities

In addition to initiating and carrying out evaluation studies UTV provides technical support to Sida in its area of expertise. It can be estimated that 25 % of a total UTV staff time is used for various support activities. These cover a wide area and involve all professional UTV staff to a larger or lesser degree. UTV's director participates in the meetings with Sida's Management Board with a right to opine. Also the director, or the person so designated, has a right to participate in the work of Sida's central project committee which scrutinizes contributions exceeding 50 Million SEK. UTV staff also regularly provides comments on draft country strategies. In addition UTV staff participates in various thematic networks and working groups within Sida. In recent years UTV has also provided technical support to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs on evaluation matters, notably through the participation in the evaluation of IFAD (see section 4.3.7).

Another important area of UTV support is the advisory services provided to Sida's departments and embassies regarding evaluation planning, the writing of terms of reference, recruitment of external evaluators and how to evaluate tenders for evaluation work etc. A new Sida Evaluation Manual was published and widely disseminated in 2004. Dissemination activities geared to Sida in Stockholm and to the embassies will continue in 2005. It is expected that the new manual will contribute to raising awareness of the role and importance of monitoring and evaluation in Swedish development cooperation. In particular the manual stresses the integral character of evaluation to development cooperation and emphasizes the partnership perspective in evaluation.

The on-going changes in development co-operation with increased delegation of authority to field offices, the current concerted efforts at donor harmonisation, alignment with partner countries priorities and systems and increased use of programme support modalities affect evaluation practice. It can be foreseen that embassies will be more involved in evaluation work. UTV will continue to explore how best to adapt its own outreach activities to current changes.

6 Information and Documentation

All Sida evaluations are registered and published by UTV. Since the second half of 1995, 328 evaluation reports have been published in *Sida Evaluations*. During the same period, 28 studies have appeared in *Sida Evaluation Studies*, a separate series of studies dealing with evaluation methodology. Since 1998, the reports from both series are available on Sida's website as well as in print.

Presentations of select reports from these series, as well as studies produced in co-operation with other organizations, appear in *Sida Evaluation Newsletter*. Hardcopy circulation of the newsletter is 2 200. The publication is also available at Sida's website. 32 issues have been published since it was introduced in mid 1996. 2–3 issues will be published during 2005.

UTV has an overall responsibility for Sida's organizational memory in the field of evaluation. Through UTV Sida's evaluations have been registered in Sida's library database for the organization since 1995/96. This database includes evaluations produced within the Swedish aid administration from 1985 onwards. About 2 100 evaluations are registered in the database which is accessible on-line to Sida's staff and to outside visitors at the library in Sida's Information Centre.

The evaluations registered in the database are also available in UTV's evaluation reference library, in addition to a large number of other Swedish and foreign evaluations published since 1990. UTV is currently updating the system and structure of the reference library.

7 Internal UTV Projects

In addition to the evaluation activities presented above, the department will engage in four internal projects. These projects are also listed in *Annex 1*.

During recent years a much discussed topic in evaluation theory has been evaluation as a form

of partici-patory learning process. Within such processes the evaluator becomes a facilitator of change rather than a scrutiniser or judge. UTV has identified a need to learn more about facilitating and participatory approaches and has engaged a consultant who has tailored a training programme for UTV to be carried out in the course of one year. It was launched in 2004 for all evaluators and internal auditors.

As part of its professional development programme UTV will also organize a series of mini-seminars on evaluation themes open to the evaluation network at Sida.

In 2005 UTV will continue the implementation of its communication plan. Activities that are planned within this framework include the mentioned training programme on facilitation, marketing of the UTV evaluation manual, enhanced communication with embassies, greater visibility of UTV projects on Sida's website and an elaboration and implementation of communication plans for all audits and evaluations.

The implementation of the Government Policy on Global Development justifies a review of Sida's evaluation policy. An additional impetus for this review is provided by the creation of a new independent institute for the evaluation of Swedish international development co-operation scheduled to be started in 2005. The review of Sida's evaluation policy will involve some preliminary work in 2005, the main part of the work to be carried out in 2006.
