Sida's development co-operation

SIX DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION OBJECTIVES

Sida's programmes of development co-operation are implemented in Africa, Asia, Latin America and certain European countries. Co-operation in 2003 is guided by one overall goal – to raise the standard of living of poor people in the world. The Swedish Parliament has adopted the following six specific objectives in order to achieve this overall goal.

- Economic growth Sida shall contribute to increase the production of goods and services.
- Economic and political independence Sida shall enable the partner countries to make their own decisions on their economies and other matters and to create the conditions necessary for national self-determination.
- Economic and social equality Sida shall contribute to reducing differences between rich and poor and to enabling partner countries to meet the basic needs of all their people.
- Democratic development in society Sida shall help bring about the conditions necessary to give people greater influence over development at local, regional and national levels.
- Sustainable use of natural resources and the protection of the environment Sida shall contribute to long term, sustainable management of natural resources and protection of the environment.
- Equality between women and man Sida shall promote equality between women and men.

DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION BY COUNTRY AND SECTOR

Sida's partner countries differ considerably and their preconditions for development are equally diverse. Where the largest partner countries are concerned, Sida establishes country strategies, which are then adopted by the Government of Sweden. These country strategies are Sweden's most important instrument for planning and monitoring of development co-operation at national level.

The focus of support and selection of sectors, programmes and projects are based on this overall assessment. This approach also determines decisions concerning the scope of co-operation, time schedules, forms of financing and participants. Sida's support shall reflect the efforts, reality and development needs of each individual country. Sida's operations are based on a holistic approach, which also takes into consideration Sweden's opportunities to make meaningful contributions.

Disbursements 2003

In 2003 Sida disbursed SEK 10,305,821,000 for development co-operation. In addition to this Sida used SEK 497,113,000 for administration.

Of the funds, 40.1 per cent (SEK 4,127,601,000) were allocated to countries in Africa. The main partner countries were Tanzania, Mozambique, Uganda, Ethiopia, Kenya, South Africa, Zambia, Angola and Malawi. Most of these countries are among the poorest in the world. Of the funds 32.1 per cent (SEK 1,326,858,000) financed projects in the social sectors, and 22.5 per cent (SEK 929,248,000) financed projects in the human rights and democratic governance sectors.

Countries in Asia received 23.7 per cent (SEK 2,445,140,000) of the funds. The main partner countries were Afghanistan, Palestinian Administrated Area, Bangladesh, Laos, Vietnam, Cambodia, India, Sri Lanka, and Iraq. Of the

funds 31.6 per cent (SEK 771,561,000) were allocated to projects in the social sectors, and 28.3 per cent (SEK 691,910,000) to human rights and democratic governance sectors. Some 27.2 per cent (SEK 665,032,000) financed projects in infrastructure, trade and industry, and urban development.

Latin America's share of the funds was 10.9 per cent (SEK 1,122,942,000) in 2003. The main partner countries were Nicaragua, Bolivia, Honduras, Guatemala, Colombia and El Salvador. Of the funds 39.7 per cent (SEK 445,538,000) were allocated to human rights and democratic governance and 25.4 per cent (SEK 284,842,000) to projects in the social sectors.

Some 8.4 per cent (SEK 868,946,000) of the funds were allocated to Europe (Western Balkans and Caucasus). The main partner countries were Bosnia-Herzegovina and Kosovo. Of the funds 40.2 per cent (SEK 349,258,000) financed projects in the human rights and democratic governance sectors, and 32.2 per cent (SEK 279,784,000) were allocated to projects in the sectors of infrastructure, trade and industry, and urban development.


Some 16.9 per cent (SEK 1,741,191,000) were not allocated to any specific region or country. Of these funds, 24.1 per cent (SEK 419,715,000) were targeted on social sectors and 16.9 per cent (SEK 294,441,000) on sectors in the field of natural resources.

Sida is working in four main sectors, Human rights & democratic governance; Social sectors; Infrastructure, trade & industry and urban development; and Natural resources.

Some 26.1 per cent (SEK 2,692,691,000) were allocated to the sector Human rights & democratic governance. Contributions are made for Human rights; the Legal system; Democracy; Public administration; Promotion of peace and conflict management; and Other aspects of human rights and democratic governance.

Projects in Social sectors, i.e. Education; Health care; Population issues;

Culture etc received 28.2 per cent (SEK 2,906,061,000) of the funds.


Some 19.1 per cent (SEK 1,968,956,000) of the funds were allocated to Transport; Telecommunications, 1T and postal communications; Energy; Water supply and sanitation; Housing; Trade & industry; Financial sector etc which make up the Infrastructure, trade & industry and urban development sector.

Projects in the area of Natural resources (land, water, pollution and environmental protection) received 11.6 per cent (SEK 1,195,321,000).

Some 15,0 per cent (SEK 1,542,792,000) was not allocated to any specific sector.

Sida disbursed SEK 10,305,821,000 for development co-operation in 2003; a decrease with 5.6 per cent (SEK 614,253,000) compared with 2002. Approximately half of the disbursements in 2003 were made to 23 of Sida's partner countries (30 in 2002, 25 in 2001 and 18 in 2000).

The largest proportion of Sida's development co-operation funds is allocated to Africa and it is natural therefore that Sida's largest partner countries are African. This has been the case for several years. Tanzania and Mozambique are by far the largest partner countries. Together they received 9.6 per cent (SEK 991,088,000) of Sida's funds, corresponding to 24.0 per cent of the funds to Africa.

Afghanistan and Palestinian Administrated Area have the leading position among the Asian partner countries. Together they received 6.1 per cent (SEK 621,307,000) of Sida's funds, which is 25.4 per cent of the share to Asia.

Disbursements to Latin America have decreased after earlier increase as a consequence of the contributions for reconstruction after the hurricane Mitch. Nicaragua and Bolivia are the two largest partner countries in this region and they received 4.6 per cent (SEK 477,581,000) of Sida's funds, which is 42.5 per cent of the disbursements to Latin America.

The two largest partner countries in Europe are Bosnia-Herzegovina and Serbia & Montenegro. Some 4.9 per cent (SEK 501,842,000) of the funds were allocated to these countries. This represents 57.8 per cent of the funds to European countries.

The accumulated percentage (Acc. %) states the proportion of Sida's development co-operation that the countries receive together. The four largest partner countries, for example, (Tanzania, Mozambique, Afghanistan and Nicaragua) received together 15.7 per cent of Sida's total development co-operation in 2003.

Development co-operation by country and sector over the years

The disbursements made by Sida decreased in the first years of the period 1997 to 2003. The lowest point was in 1998 with disbursements amounting to SEK 6.9 billions. The decrease was partly due to a ceiling placed on disbursements by the Swedish government. In 2001 the disbursements amounted to SEK 11.5 billions, the highest disbursement so far. After that, the disbursement has decreased, to SEK 10.9 billions in 2002 and SEK 10.3 billions in 2003. Over the entire period there has been an increase in disbursements of 35.7 per cent (SEK 2.7 billion).

Disbursements to Africa increased during the period by almost SEK 1.0 billion, though the share to Africa slightly decreased from 41.4 per cent to 40.1 per cent. Disbursements to Asia increased by SEK 0.6 billion but also here the proportion of funding decreased slightly, from 24.5 per cent to 23.7 per cent. Funding to Latin America increased by almost SEK 0.3 billion and also in this region the proportion of the fund slightly decreased from 11.5 per cent to 10.9 per cent. Disbursements to Europe more than doubled (from SEK 326,394,000 to SEK 868,946,000) during the period, which resulted in an increase of the share from 4.3 per cent to 8.4 per cent. In 2003 Sida had no disbursements to UN agencies (UN Core support). These basic grants were instead made by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs.

DIAGRAM 3: SIDA'S DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION BY REGION 1997-2003



Disbursements to all main sectors have increased during the period 1998–2003. The main sector Human rights and democratic governance received more than SEK 1.2 billion in 2003 compared with 1998. This resulted in an increase of the share from 21.3 per cent to 26.1 per cent. The increase in disbursements to the Social sectors was a bit slighter and ended up in SEK 0.7 billion, although the share decreased from 32.8 per cent to 28.2 per cent. Disbursements to the sector Infrastructure, trade & industry, and urban development increased by more than SEK 0.7 billion during the period, which resulted in an increase of the share from 18.0 per cent to 19.1 per cent. The smallest increase in disbursements occurred in the main sector Natural resources (SEK 0.2 billion).

DIAGRAM 4: SIDA'S DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION BY MAIN SECTOR 1998-2003






Sida has ten types of assistance, Project support, Sector programme support, Technical co-operation, International training programmes, Credits, Guarantees, Economic reforms, Humanitarian assistance, Research and Contributions to NGOs.

Project support is the largest type (41.8 per cent) and includes Capacity development; Investments; Information; Strategies & studies; Evaluation & audits; and Election observers & secondment of personnel. It is Sida's co-operation partner that implements the project while Sida acts as a financier and dialogue partner.

Sector Programme Support, sps, is Sida's contribution to multidonor and coordinated financial and professional support that forms an integral part of a partner government led and comprehensive reform within a policy area or sector. In order to describe the total reform effort i.e. the reform, the external support given to it and the forms of co-operation, the term Sector Wide Approach, swap may be used. In 2003 Sida allocated 5.9 per cent of the funds to sector programme support.

Credits account for 4.1 per cent of the contributions. There are different types of credits, two of which are concessionary credits and micro-financing.

Concessionary credits consist of funds borrowed on international capital markets that are combined with funds from the Swedish international aid budget and extended on soft terms. The funding for the scheme is arranged by the Swedish Export Credit Corporation (SEK) and the lending is guaranteed by the Swedish Export Credits Guarantee Board (EKN) on behalf of Sida. Sida provides the grant component with funds from the Swedish development co-operation budget.

Micro-finance is the term used to refer to different methods for giving poor people access to financial services. Sida is contributing to international efforts to develop methods and techniques for micro-financing and to disseminate these so-called "best practices" to organisations and banks that work with micro-finance, both in Sweden and in developing countries. Sida's vision is that the micro-finance sector shall be gradually integrated into the formal financial sector and be subject to supervision by the national financial supervisory authorities.

Support to **Economic Reforms** (Budget support and debt relief) account for 5.5 percent of Sida's contributions. This support is granted to poor and indebted countries, which are implementing economic reform programmes with poverty alleviation as a clear objective. The support aims to assist countries to implement their Poverty Reduction Strategies (PRS). Furthermore, countries have to respect human rights and promote democratic governance. For budget support to be considered, countries must also have a transparent state budget and a satisfactory system of public financial management. (The agreements on support for economic reforms normally have a duration of one year. If Sida's partner countries show that they are making considerable efforts in respect of economic reforms and poverty alleviation, Sida can consider longer commitments.)

The remaining types of assistance will be presented in the following sections.

Technical co-operation and international training programmes

As a means of work Technical co-operation is included in the main of Sida's work. Contributions classified as type of assistance "Technical co-operation" does not show the complete substance, only a fraction. There are components of Technical co-operation in many contributions classified as other types of

assistance. The figures below are only a specific part of all Technical cooperation that Sida works with.

Sida distinguishes between two types of technical co-operation: Contract-financed technical co-operation and other technical co-operation. In 2003, 4.8 per cent (SEK 492,842,000) of Sida's disbursements were for technical co-operation.

Contract-financed technical co-operation accounts for 1.7 per cent (SEK 177,456,000) of Sida's disbursements. The objective of contract-financed technical co-operation is to promote human resource development in low and

middle-income countries and to supply know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for the development of partner countries. It is intended that programmes of contract-financed technical co-operation should increase exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a wide range of Swedish organisations and institutions to participate in the programmes. The programmes of co-operation focus on areas in which Swedish competitiveness and know-how are strong: primarily the environment, public administration, energy, forestry, industry, transport and telecommunications sectors.



International training programmes account for 1.7 per cent (SEK 172,247,000) of Sida's funds. The aim is to promote human resource development in low and middle-income countries by providing know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for the development of partner countries. The programmes have the aim of promoting an increase in exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a broad spectrum of Swedish participation. It is intended that training programme participants shall have direct use of the knowledge they acquire in the training programmes in their working situation. The training programmes are normally arranged in Sweden but follow-up seminars can also be held in the participants' home countries.

Sida's disbursements to technical co-operation and international training programmes increased from SEK 471,514,000 in 1998 to SEK 665,089,000 in 2003, but their share of Sida's total disbursements decreased from 6.9 per cent to 6.5 per cent during the same period. Disbursements for other technical co-operation increased by 91.4 per cent from 1998 to 2003 and disbursements for contract-financed technical co-operation by 32.3 per cent during the period.

DIAGRAM 6: TECHNICAL CO-OPERATION AND INTERNATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAMMES 1998–2003




On the contrary, disbursements for international training programmes remained almost at the same level during the period.

Humanitarian assistance

Swedish humanitarian assistance has the objective of alleviating the consequences of natural disasters and armed conflicts for those affected. Priority is given to countries that lack resources of their own to mitigate the effects. Sida works on the basis of the needs of those affected and utilises local capacity as well as the skills of the organisations implementing the projects.

Humanitarian assistance accounts for 15.3 per cent of Sida's development co-operation. It is mostly given in situations of conflict (75.0 per cent of the humanitarian assistance), that lead to tragic interruptions in the normal lives of people. Swedish humanitarian assistance is based on international humanitarian law and the principles of impartiality, neutrality and independence of the humanitarian actors. Long-term effects are taken into consideration in the planning of the projects, which, in addition to emergency relief, can have the

character of prevention, preparedness, rehabilitation and reconstruction.

Humanitarian assistance is administered through grants to Swedish and international non-governmental organisations (NGOS), the international Red

Cross and Red Crescent Movement, and un bodies as well as through Swedish government agencies.

Prevention – Contributions to decrease vulnerability and increase preparedness to natural disasters, and to activities that promote dialogue, enhances security and addresses structural causes of armed conflict.

Emergency assistance – Contributions of humanitarian assistance to victims of disasters and conflicts.

Reconstruction – Contributions to social reconstruction after natural disasters and conflicts.

Other – Contributions connected to natural disasters and conflicts that do not fall under the other headings.

Research

The objective of research co-operation is to support research that is of significance for development in developing countries. This is done by providing support to improve the capacity of developing countries to run research programmes of their own and by providing support to research that can contribute to the solution of important development problems. Research co-operation accounted for 7.7 per cent (SEK 792,099,000) of Sida's development co-operation in 2003.

Bilateral research co-operation

Almost 23 per cent of Sida's appropriation for research co-operation are allocated to bilateral co-operation with developing countries, primarily to develop national research capacity. Swedish bilateral research co-operation has used a model based on co-operation between universities in a developing country and universities in primarily Sweden or neighbouring countries. Programmes of scientific co-operation, as well as research training leading to research degrees for students from Sida's partner countries, are run on the basis of pro-


jects jointly formulated by the Swedish and the partner countries' institutions. These programmes combine work at the home institution in a partner country with research studies at the Swedish partner institution.

International research programmes.

Sida supports research programmes run under the auspices of the World Health Organisation (who), the Consultative Group for International Agricultural Research (cgiar), United Nations Research Institute for Social Development (unrisd), and United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (unesco). These programmes retain an overview of ongoing research, identify knowledge gaps relating to development needs and channel support for addressing such issues. More than 29 per cent of Sida's fund for research cooperation were allocated to international programmes in 2003.

Regional research programmes

This type of support aims to mobilise national capacity and address thematic



research priorities in areas of common interest. Sida is supporting regional research networks in Africa, Latin America and Asia that focus, for example, on social sciences, energy, environment and biotechnology. Almost 24 per cent of Sida's appropriation for research co-operation in 2003 were allocated to regional research programmes.


Special programmes and initiatives.

Sida supports research in important areas that require special attention. Several special projects are linked to the four action programmes that guide Sida's international development co-operation: sustainable development, poverty reduction, gender equality, and peace, democracy and human rights.

Sida's Research Council.

Researchers in Swedish institutions can apply each year for grants for research into problems of relevance to developing countries. Here Sida functions as a research council and five scientific reference groups are attached to Sida for the

assessment of applications. One important objective is to give Swedish researchers the possibility to study development problems and thereby to establish and strengthen development research at Swedish universities. In 2003 SEK 101,937,000 were allocated for Sida's Research Council.

Between 1998 and 2003 Sida's research co-operation, as a share of total disbursements, decreased slightly from 8.0 per cent to 7.7per cent, but actual disbursements increased from SEK 547,252,000 to SEK 792,099,000.

Contributions to non-governmental organisations

Over 300 Swedish NGOS are active in international development co-operation. Their activities, which include approximately 2000 projects in more than 100 different countries, cover a large number of different areas. Some organisations, together with their partners, work to influence normative issues such as human rights or children's rights. Others work together with local organisations that provide direct support to specially vulnerable or marginalized target groups in the form, for example, of health care or educational facilities. Many organisations combine both functions. Common to all these inputs is that they are implemented in co-operation with local partners in partner countries.

The so-called project grants are one of the foundations of Sida's co-operation with Swedish NGOs. They permit the organisations to run activities for which they receive grants from Sida. The main rule is that the NGO must contribute 20 per cent of the total amount of the project.

Today project grants are channelled through 12 so-called frame organisations. These organisations administer the applications for grants from organi-

sations under them and present these to Sida for approval. The 12 frame organisations are:

- Africa Groups of Sweden
- · Diakonia, Sweden
- Swedish NGO Centre for Development Cooperation (Forum Syd)
- LO/TCO Council of International Trade Union Cooperation
- Olof Palme International Center, OPIC
- PMU Interlife
- Swedish Save the Children
- Swedish Cooperative Centre, scc
- Church of Sweden Aid/Church of Sweden Mission, sFRV
- Swedish Organisation of Handicapped International Aid, SHIA
- Swedish Missionary Council, SMR
- Training for Development Assistance, UBV

The frame organisations also receive information grants from Sida for their information projects in Sweden. These projects are intended to improve understanding of development and stimulate opinion in issues related to development and development co-operation.

In total, contributions to NGOS from Sida's different bugetlines sum up to 13.2 per cent (SEK 1,357,690,000) in the form of the type of assistance "Contributions to NGOS" (diagram 5). In addition to this, other types of assistance also use NGOS as a channel for the funds: SEK 2,008,083,000 in 2003. All together, Sida's development co-operation via NGOS ended at SEK 3,365,773,000 in 2003.



The total disbursements channelled via NGOS increased from SEK 2,370,551,000 in 1998 to SEK 3,365,773,000 in 2003, but their share of Sida's total disbursements decreased from 34.5 per cent to 32.7 per cent during the same period. Funds channelled via international NGOS increased its share of the funds channelled via NGOS, from 8.5 per cent in 1998 to 29.6 per cent in 2003, as did the funds channelled via partner country NGOS, from 6.9 per cent in 1998 to 11.6 per cent in 2003. Funds channelled via Swedish NGOS decreased from 67.4 per cent in 1998 to 51.3 per cent in 2003. Also other NGOS received a smaller share of the funds channelled via NGOS, from 17.2 per cent in 1998 to 7.5 per cent in 2003.

SIDA'S FOUR ACTION PROGRAMMES

Sida has established action programmes in pivotal areas of international development co-operation: poverty reduction; peace, democracy & human rights; gender equality; and environment & sustainable development.

Country strategies and the four action programmes form the background on

which the selection of inputs in each individual country and the concentration of operations to central sectors or problem areas are based. Sida plans new activities jointly with each partner country.

The figures presented under these headings are an indication of the proportion of Sida's contributions that can be considered to be within the scope of a particular action programme.

Poverty reduction

Reducing poverty is the overriding goal of all Sida's international development co-operation. Sida's point of departure is that the governments of partner countries are responsible for reducing poverty and for sustainable development. The programme states how Sida can support the efforts and improve the capacity of the partner countries. In countries where poverty reduction is not given priority by the government, the main part of Sida's support shall be directed to programmes that provide direct benefits for the poor, mainly through non-governmental channels.

Economic growth is a prerequisite for the sustainable reduction of poverty. There are no examples in which mass poverty has been eliminated without the aid of strong economic growth. But economic growth in itself is not sufficient. It must be part of a deliberate overall policy for poverty reduction.

Sida's main task is to support the type of growth that leads to a sustainable reduction of poverty.

Sida distinguishes between four categories of poverty reduction projects and programmes:

Direct effect – Usually targeted projects and sector support aimed directly at local communities with poor groups of people.


Projects and programmes in which poor groups are included — Programmes or projects which reach several social categories including the poor, e g support to primary education and primary health care, which is targeted at the total population in an area but includes poor groups as well.

Indirect effect through policies and institutions — Projects or programmes which promote equitable growth-oriented policies, macro-economic stability and reforms, which includes improvements for poor groups by removing systemic constraints at national and international levels. Examples of such projects are legislation and institution building which promote economic and social growth and democratic governance; tax reforms; and macro-economic reforms which stimulate growth and increase revenues and which may lead to employment opportunities for the poor.

Support at national level, which indirectly affects poverty reduction — Projects which stimulate the growth of resources and employment opportunities and which preserve natural resources. This group includes balance of payments support and debt relief, investments in infrastructure (including transport, telecommunications and energy), trade and industry and projects for the preservation of natural resources.

Between 1998 and 2003 projects with an effect on poverty reduction increased, from 89.2 per cent to 94.0 per cent. Examples of projects that have been classified as "other effects" are internal Sida studies in a particular area or methods development projects. In the long-term these can also have an effect on poverty reduction. During 1998 to 2003 projects with a "direct effect" increased, from 16.6 per cent in 1998 to 20.8 per cent in 2003 and so did Projects with "indirect effect through policies and institutions", from 31.8 per cent to 43.0 per cent. "Projects and programmes in which poor groups are includ-

ed" decreased from 27.5 per cent in 1998 to 17.4 per cent in 2003 while projects with "support to national level which indirectly affects poverty reduction" stayed at almost the same level.


Peace, democracy and human rights

Democratic development also provides a good – though not insufficient – foundation on which to build a society based on equality and to give people the opportunity to participate in development. Government institutions, and a civil society that functions effectively, are of fundamental importance for the consolidation of democracy.

Democratic development and respect for human rights provide basic instruments to achieve peaceful solutions to conflicts and to prevent armed conflicts.

Sida considers that the fulfilment of certain minimum requirements is essential for democratic governance: free elections including the possibility to choose between alternative candidates; an independent legal system; and respect for fundamental democratic rights and privileges.





Principal objective – The strengthening of peace, democracy and human rights is the primary objective of these operations. The project is expected to promote democratic processes or strengthen respect for human rights. Material will be produced on project goals and on the activities relevant to the strengthening of peace, democracy and human rights.

Significant objective — One of the project objectives is to strengthen peace, democracy and human rights. Material will be produced on project activities, relevant to the strengthening of peace, democracy and human rights.

In 1998 69.8 per cent of the projects had either a principal or significant peace, democracy and human rights objective. This increased to 80.8 per cent in 2003. Projects with peace, democracy and human rights as the principal objective have remained constant, at around 20 per cent during 1998–2001, but increased to 34.8 per cent in 2003. Projects with peace, democracy and human rights as a significant objective decreased from 50.0 per cent in 1998 to 46.0 per cent in 2003.

Gender equality

World poverty is increasingly depicted by the face of a woman. In many countries women are not allowed to own land and other assets. They also hold a weaker financial position than men in the family, the local community, the nation and internationally, at the same time as they have limited opportunities of participating in the decisions which affect their situation. Violence against women is increasing and women in particular are seriously affected by armed conflicts.

Equality between women and men is a human rights issue and a prerequisite for sustainable development.

Sida gives priority to measures that promote the human rights and economic independence of women and equality where participation in political and economic decision-making processes is concerned.

Principal objective – Promotion of equality between women and men is the primary objective of the project. An analysis of the situation of women and men is part of the project. Two of the criteria listed below have been fulfilled.

Significant objective – Promotion of equality between women and men is one of the project objectives. An analysis of the situation of women and men has been made and two of the criteria listed below have been fulfilled.

Criteria

- Strategies and implementation plans are based on the gender equality perspective and its consequences.
- Specific measures have been taken to deal with existing constraints on the full and equal participation of women.
- Specific measures have been taken to secure equal control over the outcomes of the project by both women and men.
- Indicators have been developed or will be developed for monitoring and evaluation which will make it possible to measure results from a gender equality perspective.
- Gender equality specialists have been utilised in the design phase and will be utilised in the implementation and follow up phases and/or gender equality training has been offered/is planned.
- Consultations have been held with both women and men.

In 2003 the proportion of projects in which gender equality was a principal or significant equality objective was 71.9 per cent, an increase from 63.2 per

cent in 1998. The proportion of projects in which gender equality was the principal increased from 7.0 per cent in 1998 to 12.2 per cent in 2003 while the proportion of projects in which gender equality was a significant objective increased from 56.2 per cent to 59.7 per cent during the same period.

Environment and sustainable development

Environmental aspects shall be integrated into all Sida's development co-operation programmes in accordance with the undertakings ensuing from Sweden's accession to Agenda 21 and other international environmental conventions. All projects are assessed on the basis of their effect on the environment.

Sida gives priority to supporting the management of scarce water resources; agriculture and forestry/soil conservation; the marine environment; the urban environment; and environment-friendly consumption and production of energy.

Principal objective – The project shall protect or improve the physical and/or biological environment, promote the sustainable management of natural

DIAGRAM 13: GENDER EQUALITY 1998-2003





DIAGRAM 14: ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT 1998-2003



resources, decrease existing levels of environmental degradation and contain specific measures for the development or strengthening of environmental policies, legislation, capacity, public administration or other organisations/instruments for the preservation of the environment.

Significant objective – One of the project's objectives is to protect or improve the physical and/or biological environment.

In 1998 the proportion of projects in which the environment and sustainable development was a principal or a significant objective was 49.7 per cent. This increased to 54.7 per cent in 2003. This change was due to an increase of projects in which it was a significant objective; from 36.3 per cent in 1998 to 43.6 per cent in 2003.

Sida's Co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe

Most countries in Central and Eastern Europe are in a process of transition from dictatorships to democracy and from planned economies to market economies. Initially the standard of living of large groups in some of these countries has declined. In several cases average life expectancy has also diminished substantially. In other countries the transition has been implemented with great rapidity and success. A closer relationship with the EU is a key issue for the region.

Sida's co-operation aims at promoting the process of transition through support to political, economic and social reforms, co-operation with neighbouring countries in respect of the environment, energy, and equality, and support for integration with the EU.

CO-OPERATION WITH CENTRAL AND EASTERN EUROPE BY COUNTRY AND OPERATIONAL AREA

The Swedish Parliament has established five specific operational areas for cooperation with countries in Central and Eastern Europe:

- · Common security
- Deepening the culture of democracy
- Economic transition
- · Social security
- Environment

Each country has its own distinctive character and the potential for development varies considerably from country to country. Sida makes proposals for country strategies, which shall be approved by the Government, for the most important partner countries. These strategies are the most important instrument to guide co-operation at country level. The objectives of the support and the selection of sectors, programmes and projects are determined on the basis of an overall assessment. This holistic approach also determines the scope of co-operation, the time frame, forms of financing and participants.

Moreover, during 2003 disbursements amounting to SEK 33.3 billions were earmarked, by the Swedish Parliament, to special humanitarian assistance and conflict prevention projects in Russia. These disbursements can not be referred to any of the operational areas for the co-operation in Central and Eastern Europe.

Disbursements 2003


SEK 589,156,000 (administrative costs included) was allocated to Central and Eastern Europe in 2003.

Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Ukraine, Russia and Belarus have been given priority by the Swedish government. Some 74.4 per cent (SEK 438,436,000) of the disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe are allocated to these countries.

Some 39.2 per cent (SEK 230,875,000) of the funds for Central and Eastern Europe were allocated to **Russia**. The priorities of Sida's co-operation with Russia are support to reforms. Another important area is to improve the environment. Some 29.2 per cent (SEK 67,370,000) were allocated for this purpose in 2003. In addition 24.5 per cent (SEK 56,534,000) financed economic transitions. Some 14.4 per cent of the disbursements to Russia were allocated to projects associated to humanitarian assistance and conflict prevention.

Ukraine's share of the funds for Central and Eastern Europe were 9.5 per cent

(SEK 55,804,000). Some 41.4 (SEK 23,129,000) per cent were allocated to deepening the culture of democracy while 32.7 per cent (SEK 18,234,000) financed economic transition projects.


Some 2.3 per cent (SEK 13,831,000) were allocated to **Belarus**. Economic transition projects had a high priority and received 51.4 per cent (SEK 7,103,000) of the fund. Some 30.1 per cent (SEK 4,167,000) were allocated to deepening the culture of democracy.

The Baltic States received 23.4 per cent (SEK 137,927,000) of the funds for Central and Eastern Europe. Some 6.8 per cent (SEK 40,278,000) were allocated to **Latvia**. Here, the priorities of Sida's co-operation were focused on improving the environment. 67.4 per cent (SEK 27,130,000) were allocated for this purpose in 2003.

Lithuania's share of the funds for Central and Eastern Europe were 6.6 per cent (SEK 39,164,000). Environment and energy and the integration into the European Union are areas given priority by Sida. Some 50.2 per cent (SEK 19,647,000) of the funds were allocated to environment projects and 28.2 per cent (SEK 11,055,000) to deepening the culture of democracy.

Some 3.0 per cent (SEK 17,735,000) were allocated to **Estonia**. A main task for Sida is to facilitate Estonia's integration into the European Union. Some 27.5 per cent (SEK 4,882,000) were allocated to deepening the culture of democra-

cy. In addition, environment projects received 39.3 per cent (SEK 6,976,000).

Sida allocated some 6.9 per cent (SEK 40,750,000) to **Regional Baltic Region**. Almost half of the disbursements (SEK 19,351,000) were focused on deepening the culture of democracy while environment projects received 37.8 per cent (SEK 15,385,000) of the funds.

25.6 per cent (SEK 150,720,000) of the the funds for Central and Eastern Europe were allocated to **other countries** than the priority countries. **Regional Central and Eastern Europe** received the mainpart of these disbursements; 78,3 per cent (SEK 118,023,000). In addition, the former priority country Poland received 17.1 per cent (SEK 25,846,000). Social security projects had a high priority in Regional Central and Eastern Europe while the environment were in focus in **Poland.**

Sida disbursed 29.2 per cent (SEK 172,018,000) to projects for environment projects, 24.9 per cent (SEK 146,994,000) to deepening the culture of democracy and 19.3 per cent (SEK 113,480,000) to economic transition projects. The disbursements for social security projects amounted to 18.7 per cent (SEK 109,894000) and common security projects ended at 2.3 per cent (SEK 13,472,000). The earmarked "humanitarian assistance and conflict prevention" disbursements amounted to 5.7 per cent (SEK 33,299,000) of the total disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe.

Co-operation by country and operational area over the years

The disbursements made by Sida increased in the first years of the period 1998 to 2003. The highest point was in 2001 with disbursements amounting to SEK 694,279,000. Since then the disbursement has decreased and amounted to SEK 589,156,000 in 2003. Although, this is a increase by 8.1 per cent compared with 1998.

Disbursements to Russia increased from 18.9 per cent (Sek 103,160,000) in 1998 to 39.2 per cent (Sek 230,875,000) in 2003. Ukraine increased its share, from 2.8 per cent (Sek 15,274,000) in 1998 to 9.5 per cent (Sek 55,804,000) in 2003, as did the disbursements to Belarus, from 0.3 per cent (Sek 1,898,000) to 2.3 per cent (Sek 1,808,000) to 2.3 per

13,831,000) during the same period. Disbursements to the three Baltic countries decreased over the period: in Latvia from 11.8 per cent (SEK 64,486,000) to 6.8 per cent (SEK 40,278,000), in Estonia from 4.4 per cent (SEK 24,099,000) to 3.0 per cent (SEK 17,735,000) and in Lithuania from 9.0 per cent (SEK 48,850,000) to 6.6 per cent (SEK 39,164,000).

Before 2002 The Swedish Parliament established four operational areas for co-operation with countries in Central and Eastern Europe. Previously, "Economic transition" and "Social security" were one operational area, "Socially sustainable economic transition".

Disbursements to "Common security" and "Deepening the culture of democ-

racy" increased, from 0 per cent in 1998 to 2.3 per cent (SEK 13,472,000) in 2003 and from 13.2 per cent (SEK 71,974,000) to 24.9 per cent (SEK 146,994,000). Disbursements to "Environment" fell from 42.2 per cent (SEK 230,235,000) to 29.2 per cent (SEK 172,018,000).

Disbursements to "Economic transition" and "Social security" received 19.3 per cent (SEK 113,480,000) and 18.7 per cent (SEK 109,894,000) of the total funds in 2003. This was slighter decreases for both of the areas comparing with the disbursements in 2002.


CO-OPERATION BY TYPE OF ASSISTANCE

Sida focuses its support to make it correspond to the efforts, reality and development needs of each individual country.

Sida's ten types of assistance also apply to co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe. The types are Project support, Sector programme support, Technical co-operation, International training programmes, Credits, Guarantees, Economic reforms, Humanitarian assistance, Research, and Contributions to NGOS.

For more information on the types on assistance see the section above in this booklet.

Project support accounted for 28.2 per cent of the disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe while credits received 1.2 per cent of the funds. Sector programme support is a fairly new type of support. In 2003 Sida disbursed 0.3 per cent of the funds to Central and Eastern Europe with this type of assistance. The disbursements for Humanitarian assistance were specially earmarked for this purpose during 2003 and stayed at 5.7 per cent. No funds were allocated through Economic reforms, Guarantees or Research in 2003. The other types of assistance are presented in the following sections.

Technical co-operation and international training programmes

As a means of work Technical co-operation is included in the main of Sida's work. Contributions classified as type of assistance "Technical co-operation" does not show the complete substance, only a fraction. There are components of Technical co-operation in many contributions classified as other types of assistance. The figures below are only a specific part of all Technical co-operation that Sida works with.

Sida distinguishes between two types of technical co-operation, Contract-financed technical co-operation and other technical co-operation. In 2003 50.0



per cent (SEK 294,385,000) of Sida's disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe were in the form of technical co-operation.

Contract-financed technical co-operation accounts for 37.6 per cent (SEK 221,752,000) of Sida's disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe. The objective of contract-financed technical co-operation is to promote human resource development in low and middle-income countries and to supply know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for the development of partner countries. Programmes of contract-financed technical co-operation shall promote exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a wide range of Swedish organisations and institutions to participate in the programmes. The programmes of co-operation focus on areas in which Swedish competitiveness and know-how are strong: primarily the environment, public administration, energy, forestry, industry, transport and telecommunications sectors.

Other technical co-operation received 12.3 per cent (SEK 72,633,000) of Sida's disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe.

Some 1.0 per cent (SEK 5,933,000) of Sida's funds to Central and Eastern Europe were used for **International training programmes**. The aim is to promote human resource development in low and middle-income countries by providing know-how in areas that are of strategic importance for the development of partner countries. The international training programmes shall promote exchanges of skills and experience between Sweden and partner countries and encourage a broad spectrum of Swedish participation. It is intended that training programme participants shall have direct use of the knowledge they acquire in the training programmes in their working situation. The training programmes are normally arranged in Sweden but follow-up seminars can also be held in the participants' home countries.

Sida's disbursements for technical co-operation and international training programmes increased from sek 278,054,000 in 1998 to sek 300,318,000 in

2003, although the share of Sida's disbursements to Central and Eastern Europe stayed at around 51 per cent. The disbursements for Contract-financed technical co-operation have increased by 71.1 per cent from 1998 to 2003. During the same period, disbursements for Other technical co-operation decreased by 48.1 per cent while disbursements for International training programmes decreased by 30.2 per cent.

Contributions to non-governmental organisations

The so-called project grants are one of the foundations of Sida's co-operation with Swedish NGOs. They permit the organisations to run activities for which they receive grants from Sida. The main rule is that the NGO must contribute 20 per cent of the total amount of the project.

Today project grants are channelled through 10 so-called frame organisa-

tions. These organisations administer the applications for grants from organisations under them and present these to Sida for approval. The 10 frame organisations are:



The frame organisations also receive information grants from Sida for their information projects in Sweden. These projects are intended to improve understanding of development and stimulate opinion in issues related to development and development co-operation.

In total, contributions to NGOS from Sida's different bugetlines to Central and Eastern Europe sum up to 13.6 per cent (SEK 80,210,000) in the form of the type of assistance "Contributions to NGOS" (diagram 17). In addition to this, other types of assistance also use NGOS as a channel for the funds: SEK 80,443,000 thousand in 2003.

The disbursements channelled via NGOS increased in the first years of the period 1998 to 2003. The highest point was in 2000 with disbursements amounting to SEK 167 billions. After that, funds channelled via NGOS has decreased and stayed at SEK 110 billions in 2002. In 2003 the disbursements increased again and amounted to SEK 161 billions. 80.5 per cent of these disbursements were channelled via Swedish NGOS and 17.7 per cent via International NGOS.

Quality etc.

GENERAL

The information in this publication concerns Sida's development co-operation and co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe, both multilateral and bilateral, *in 2003*. Some conditions have changed since then.

All amounts show net disbursements, i.e. amounts paid out minus any repaid amounts (unutilised funds remaining after completion of project or programme which are repaid to donor), in SEK thousands, current prices.

The figures are obtained from Sida's financial administration and planning system, Plus, where officers enter statistics relevant to their inputs. The statistics constitute a large part of the report on Sweden's statistics made by Sida to the OECD's Development Assistance Committee (DAC). To make international statistics in this area comparable between donor countries, definitions and directives are written and agreed upon by the member countries of OECD/DAC. Sida makes considerable efforts to make its statistics comparable and correct.

No consideration has been taken of the appropriation accounts. The breakdown between development co-operation and co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe is based on the countries.

The development co-operation administration is not shown in this publication, except for Appendix 1. Appropriation accounts.

COMPARISON WITH OTHER PUBLICATIONS

Sida's annual report

Sida's annual report shows costs while this publication shows disbursements. The distinction between costs and disbursements concerns accounting techniques. Costs are the sum of the invoices registered during the period of one year. Costs become disbursements only when the invoice has been paid i.e. an invoice may be registered during 2002 but disbursement is not made until 2003.

The operational areas shown in the annual report do not correspond to the sectors presented here.

Statistical report 2001

Differences in the operational areas for co-operation with countries in Central and Eastern Europe occur since The Swedish Parliament established five specific operational areas in 2002. In 2001 and earlier there where four operational areas.

Statistical yearbook 2002

The Statistical Yearbook shows Sweden's development co-operation and co-operation with Central and Eastern Europe in 2002 in which Sida is only one of the many parties involved.

The *opening amounts* refer to the funds that have been transferred from the savings made in previous years on extended appropriations or framework appropriations.
