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2 INTRODUCTION

Sida provides support to several thousand projects in various developing countries. In order to keep track of numbers of contributions and the amount of development assistance disbursed to different countries and different sectors, the forms of development cooperation used and so on, all contributions are classified at Sida. The aims of the classification of contributions are:

- to be able to provide requested statistics;
- to permit the simple follow-up of contributions and objectives by providing information for analyses, evaluations and follow-ups;
- to contribute comparable international statistics on international development cooperation;
- to provide background material and information for participation in debates on important political issues;
- to facilitate the work on publications such as the Annual Report, Budget Documents, Statistical Report etc;
- to facilitate searches for information based on the characteristics of the contributions.

It is of the greatest importance that contributions/components are classified correctly when registered. This publication is intended to give you assistance with this. If you are not certain how to classify a contribution/component, don't worry – ask the person responsible for statistics in your department. There is a list of persons responsible for statistics at Sida on iNSIDE, the Swedish version. (Stödfunktioner-Projektrum-Nätverk-Statistiknätverket-Projektmedlemmar). You can also ask the officer responsible for statistics at EVU/Ekonomi.

Since such a large amount of information is registered in PLUS, we can also extract a great deal of information from the system. Information can be obtained on all statistics registered in PLUS. Information can be obtained from the PLUS reports and from LIS, our output system. All members of staff at Sida can now search for information in LIS, as well as employees at embassies and field offices who are linked up to iNSIDE. If you want specific reports, you can turn to the officer responsible for statistics at EVU/Ekonomi.

3 PLUS

PLUS is Sida's financial reporting and planning system and it is in the planning part of the system that agreements, contributions, components and contracts are classified. The planning system consists of three main windows - Contribution, Agreement and Contract. The classification of contributions/components is done in the Contribution window.

3.1 How to make searches in PLUS

You may need to search for information in PLUS for several reasons. Possibly you want to know what alternatives are available when you want to enter a new contribution, perhaps you need to have a list of everything that has been registered, or you may want to find, for example, a specific agreement or a specific code.

When you search for information, there are rules that you need to be aware of and to think about.

Rules for making searches

- All the criteria you enter in the window must be fulfilled for the search to be successful.
- If you search with the aid of Agreement id, Contribution id or other code made up of figures, a list is shown beginning with the value you have selected. After every 5 000 items you will be asked if you wish to continue. If you have already found what you are looking for, you can answer No. If you answer Yes PLUS will find the next 5 000 items.
- If you search with the aid of text, i.e. in a Title, the best method is to select a key word. If you place an asterisk (*) in front of the word, for example *who, you will obtain a list of those titles that have "who" in the beginning, in the middle or at the end. The search will make no distinction between capital letters and small letters. However, if you write "who" without an asterisk, you will merely obtain a list of titles that begin with "who" and only those with small letters.

N.B.

Do not write long words, merely use part of the word. You cannot know whether the word has been abbreviated in the title, or what form it has. Combine with responsible unit, partner country, allocation account or responsible officer. Do not use more criteria for your search than necessary. What is it you really want to find?

- If you search in a date field, you will only be given information that has exactly the same value as that you entered. It is not possible to use an asterisk (*).

It is possible to make searches in almost all fields (all small white boxes).

How do I get to the box to make my search?

1. Go to the field you are interested in and press F2.
2. If it is not possible to make searches from that field, a bell will sound and you will see "Search cannot be done in this field" in the lower left-hand corner of the window. You can then press Ctrl+F1 (which is PLUS' help field) either to obtain an explanatory text, or a list of possible alternatives. Where the help field is concerned, you must close the small window which appears by clicking on the white data field again and then entering what should be there.



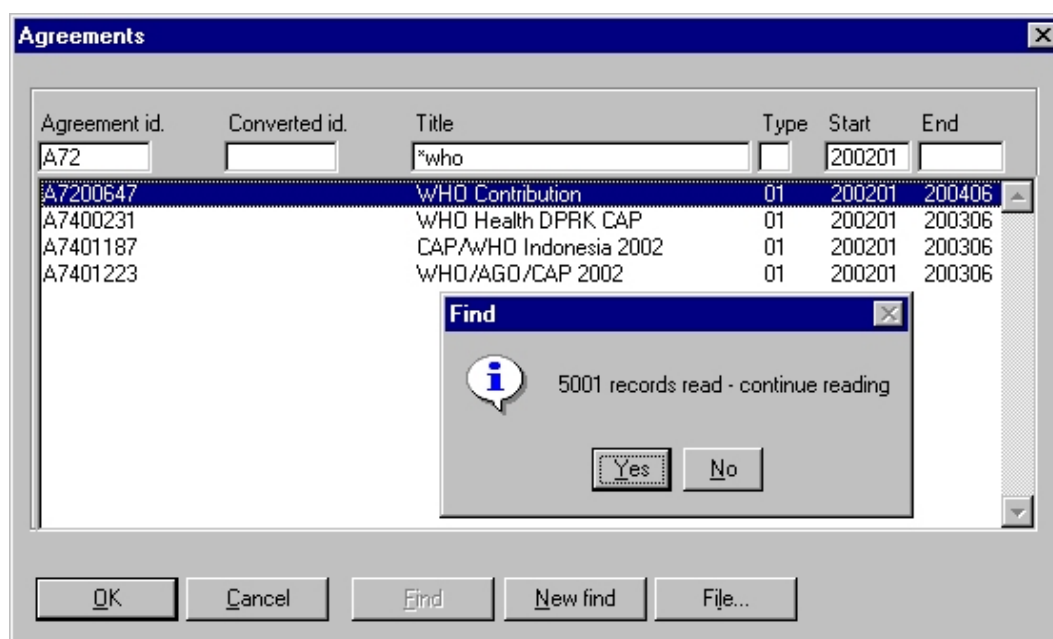

In the example above, Agreement id. must begin with A72 or higher, Title must contain “who” in one form or another and Agreement Start must be 200201.

You can find further information on PLUS on iNSIDE. You can also obtain help from the person responsible for statistics in your department or from the PLUS help-desk (ext. 5195).

4 CONTRIBUTION

A **contribution** is the financial support given by Sida for a project. There is a Plan of Operations for each project.

In this context, a project consists of all the contributions that lead to a predetermined goal. Sida's contributions can finance part of the project or the entire project.

Further guidance is given in the User Manual for PLUS.

Example

A **contribution** can be, for example:

- Sida's support to a project in a programme of sector support in a certain country
- A decision on framework support to a non-governmental organisation
- A decision on support to a non-governmental organisation
- Sida's funding of a programme of contract-financed technical cooperation.

Registration in PLUS

Contributions are registered in the Contribution window. Where those fields that are not taken up below are concerned, directions can be found in the User manual for PLUS which can be found on iNSIDE.

The figures in the illustration below refer to the chapters where you can find information and directions on each field.

4.1 Contribution title (Swe + Eng)

The title of the contribution shall be entered here in both Swedish and English. The title may consist of a maximum of 25 letters and figures. It should provide a comprehensible description of the contribution. It should be written in small letters with the exception of the first letter and any abbreviations. The abbreviations should be of general character that everyone understands. If you have a contribution that concerns specific organisations, for example various UN agencies, you should include the organisation's name in the title.

Formulate the title so that even the uninitiated understand what the contribution refers to.

Avoid

- stating the partner country's code in the title
- writing "support to" or similar phrases since they do not provide any information at all on the contribution.
- giving the decision number or other identification numbers since these do not describe what the contribution is about for the uninitiated.

Example

Other points to note

- The Swedish title must be given in order to meet external requirements in respect of reports, for example when making reports to other government agencies or providing information to the general public.
- The reason for having a title in English is partly for our local employees at embassies and partly since the title is reported to the Development Assistance Committee, which can use the title in its publications and on the Internet.

4.2 Partner country

The **partner country** is the country or region to which the contribution is allocated, often where the project is implemented. A contribution can refer to several countries or regions.

Classification

The codes that shall be used in the Partner Country field are available per country or region and there is also a code for global contributions. The country codes follow the international ISO standard of three letters. After the three letters there can, in certain cases, be a figure that relates to a region within a country. Regions of countries, for example West Africa, also have a code consisting of three letters, but these codes do not follow an international standard.

The code for global contributions (GGG) should mainly be used when the contribution refers to global development programmes, regular grants to UN agencies or global methods development.

Information on changes and additions to codes will be given on iNSIDE.

You can search for country codes and region codes in the Partner Country field.

Search for codes by

1. Place the cursor in the Partner country field and press F2
2. In the field which appears, go to the field Title
3. Start with a * and then enter the first letters of the name of the country or region (e.g. *hond), press F2
4. A list of alternatives is shown. Mark the code you want to use and press OK. The code appears automatically in the field.

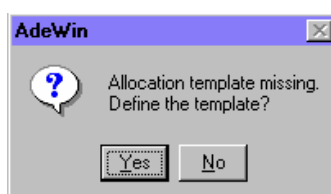

The contribution can refer to several countries or regions. A distribution can then be made between the various countries.

Distribute a contribution between several countries or regions

1. Enter the code DIST in the Partner country field, press Tab.
2. Move to the field Template. Here you can either enter the name of an existing distribution template or the name you wish to give your new distribution template. Press Tab.
3. If the distribution template does not exist, a box will appear which states that the distribution template does not exist and asks you if you wish to create a new distribution template. Press Yes if you want to have a new template.



Warning!

If you use a template that you or someone else has made earlier, you should not change anything in the template. Changes of the template have the effect that all components that use the template are changed.

4. Now the window shown below will appear and you can enter a title for the distribution template in the box to the right of the code.

5. Then enter the code for a country/region. You can find the code for the country/region with the aid of F2.
6. Enter the country's share in the form of a percentage of the contribution.
7. Continue to follow points 5 and 6 until 100 per cent has been distributed. Press F12 or OK to save and then press Cancel in order to return to the Contribution window.

4.3 Letter of appropriations

The codes under this heading are financial conditions, environmental conventions and other areas that need to be followed up and which cannot be followed up in any other way.

Classification

Several codes can refer to one contribution. In such cases all codes shall be given. The codes should be entered after each other without a space or comma between them. N.B. The codes consist of a letter and one or two figures. If you enter the code KO1 Instead of Ko1, the contribution will not be included when data is extracted. The same will occur if you insert a space between K and o1 (K o1). The use of convention codes depends on whether the principal objective of the contribution (two figures) or significant objective (one figure) refers to a convention.

Financial conditions that need to be followed up have a code that begins with F. Follow-up in other areas have codes that begin with A and conventions are followed up with codes that begin with K.

It is not possible to search for the codes in PLUS.

The codes are update by EVU/Ekonomi. New codes are given on iNSIDE.

The Convention on **Biological Diversity**. Contributions which fulfil the following criteria shall be classified with this code:

- contributions that promote the preservation of biological diversity, sustainable utilisation of biological diversity and/or legitimate and impartial distribution of profits from use of genetic resources.
- contributions that contain specific measures to integrate biological diversity with a number of development objectives for partner countries or to assist partner countries in the implementation of their undertakings according to the Convention
- the documentation of contributions must clearly state which of the Convention's objectives it promotes

- the activities under the contribution shall include specific methods for the implementation of the objectives of the Convention through the protection, conservation and sustainable use of relevant ecosystems, species or genetic resources, for the alleviation of existing environmental degradation, for the development and consolidation of environmental policies, legislation and administration, or for the transfer technology for the implementation of the Convention.

K02 Principal objective

K2 Significant objective

The Climate Convention. Contributions which fulfil the following criteria shall be classified with this code:

- contributions that aim to stabilise the concentration of the greenhouse effect in the atmosphere to a level which would prevent dangerous anthropogenic effects on the climatic system
- contributions that contain specific measures to integrate climate change with a number of development objectives for partner countries or to assist partner countries in the implementation of their undertakings according to the Convention
- the documentation of contributions must clearly state which of the Convention's objectives it promotes
- the activities under the contribution shall include specific methods for the implementation of the objectives of the Convention through the protection, conservation or sustainable use of relevant ecosystems, species or genetic resources, for the alleviation of existing environmental degradation, for the development and consolidation of environmental policies, legislation and administration, or for the transfer technology for the implementation of the Convention.

K03 Principal objective

K3 Significant objective

The Convention to combat desertification. Contributions which fulfil the following criteria shall be classified with this code:

- contributions that have the objective of combating desertification and mitigating the effects of drought through prevention and/or reduction of land degradation, rehabilitation of partly degraded land, and reclamation of deserts
- contributions that contain specific measures to integrate contributions concerning desertification with a number of development objectives for partner countries or to assist partner countries in the implementation of their undertakings according to the Convention
- the documentation of the contribution must clearly state which of the Convention's objectives it promotes
- the activities under the contribution shall include specific methods for the implementation of the objectives of the Convention through the protection, conservation or sustainable use of relevant ecosystems, species or genetic resources, for the alleviation of existing environmental degradation, for the development and consolidation of environmental policies, legislation and administration, or for the transfer technology for the implementation of the Convention.

K04 Principal objective

K4 Significant objective

Montreal Protocol. Contributions that fulfil the following criteria shall be classified with this code:

- contributions that have the goal of phasing out production and use, or of reducing emissions, of ozone depleting substances
- contributions for human resource development, environmental policy, institutions, phasing-out plans, directives such as legislation and inspection
- contributions for the exchange of experience between different parties in national or international networks
- contributions that have the aim of preventing the introduction of HCFCs to replace other ozone-depleting substances
- contributions for the transfer of technology.

K05 Principal objective

K5 Significant objective

Ramsar Convention (Wetlands). Contributions that fulfil the following criteria shall be classified with this code:

- contributions for the protection and/or sustainable use of wetlands, such as concrete projects/programmes, or indirectly in the form of policy development
- contributions that include (specific) measures to integrate wetlands and issues relating to wetlands with other development objectives for the partner country or which assist the partner country to fulfil its undertakings under the Convention in some other way
- contributions that state in the programme documentation the goals of the Convention that the contribution promotes
- the activities under the contribution shall include specific methods for the implementation of the objectives of the Convention through the protection or conservation of relevant ecosystems or to counteract existing environmental degradation, for the development and consolidation of environmental policies, legislation and administration of wetlands.

K06 Principal objective

K6 Significant objective

Stockholm Convention (POPs). Contributions that fulfil the following shall be classified with this code:

- contributions that have the goal of protecting health and the environment from persistent organic pollutants (POPs)
- contributions that contain specific measures to integrate contributions concerning the phasing out of POPs with a number of development goals for the partner country, or to assist the partner country to fulfil its undertakings under the Convention
- the documentation for the contribution shall specifically state which goals of the Convention it promotes
- activities under the contribution shall contain specific methods for the implementation of the goals of the Convention through the identification and phasing-out of POPs, or for the development and consolidation of environmental policies, legislation or administration, or for the transfer technology for the implementation of the Convention.

K07 Principal objective

K7 Significant objective

Rotterdam Convention (PIC). Contributions that fulfil the following shall be classified with this code:

- contributions that have the goal of protecting health and the environment from certain hazardous chemicals through the exchange of information, better decisions and improved decision-making processes
- contributions that contain specific measures to integrate contributions concerning decision-making processes, information and dissemination of information on certain hazardous chemicals with a number of the development goals for the partner country, or to assist the partner country in fulfilling its undertakings under the Convention
- the documentation for the contribution shall specifically state which goals of the Convention that it promotes
- activities under the contribution shall contain specific methods for the implementation of the goals of the Convention through improvements to information or the dissemination of information, or for the development and consolidation of environmental policies, legislation or administration, or for the transfer technology for the implementation of the Convention.

K08 Principal objective

K8 Significant objective

Basel Convention. Contributions that fulfil the following shall be classified with this code:

- contributions that have the goal of protecting health and the environment by reducing the production and transport of environmentally hazardous waste
- contributions that contain specific measures to integrate contributions concerning the production and handling of environmentally hazardous waste with a number of the development goals for the partner country, or to assist the partner country in fulfilling its undertakings under the Convention.
- the documentation for the contribution shall specifically state which goals of the Convention that it promotes

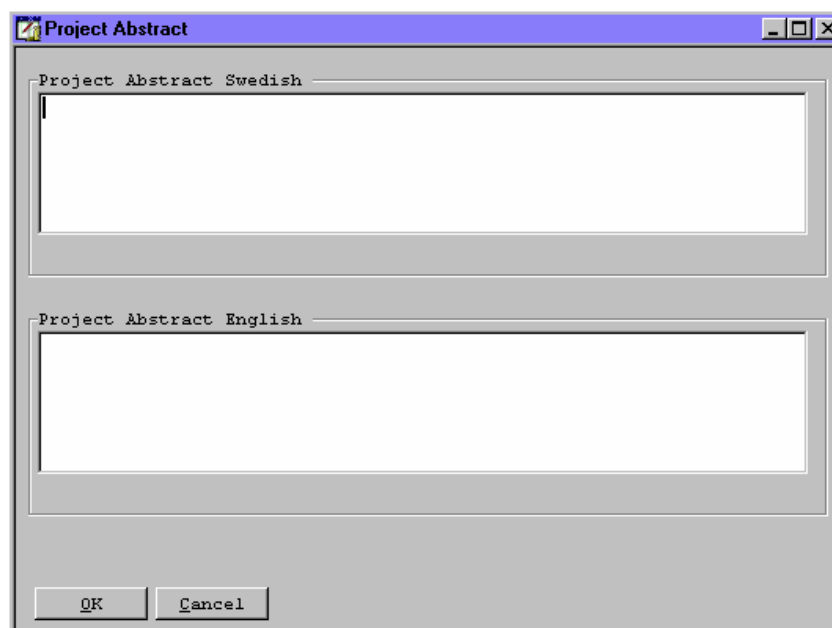
- activities under the contribution shall contain specific methods for the implementation of the goals of the Convention through the reduction of quantities and transportation and phasing-out of hazardous waste, or for the development and consolidation of environmental policies, legislation or administration, or for the transfer of technology for the implementation of the Convention.

5 PROJECT ABSTRACT

A brief description (max 420 characters) of the contribution in Swedish and English. The project abstract should contain a short general description of the contribution that expands the title of the contribution, states the goals of the contribution, and provides other essential information including information on and references to earlier contributions.

It is not obligatory to enter a project abstract, but it is strongly recommended.

In the Contribution window there is a button which leads to the Project Abstract window.



Classification

Here you can either enter text or you can cut and paste from another document into this field.

Cut and paste by

1. Marking the text you want to copy. Copy with the aid of Ctrl + c.
2. Put the cursor in the field where you want to paste in text. Press Ctrl + v.

Example

- ❖ Preparation for a project on juvenile delinquency at the Department of Justice. To describe the level of state of the juvenile system with relevant actors, their roles and responsibilities in South Africa.
- ❖ The objective of the project is to develop and make available improved technologies for production and processing of important smallholder crops, traditional food crops as well as new cash crops
- ❖ The strategy will include a policy section; a review and analysis of past Swedish experience in the hiv/aids area, national and international; and an implementation plan of the policy, including needed competence and capacity within Sweden to effectively address the epidemic.
- ❖ Preparatory phase Sexuality Education Training for primary school teachers. The preparatory phase consists of two workshops: one with regional and international expertise during November-December 1999 and a subsequent national workshop to develop supplementary sexuality education material for the students in grade 5-8.
- ❖ Seminar on Reproductive Health

6 COMPONENT

A contribution can consist of one or more **components**. It is usually the case that a contribution consists of one component. Several components should be used when the contribution includes more than one statistical concept, when different divisions at Sida are responsible for different parts of the contribution, or when it is necessary to follow up different parts of the contribution.

Further guidance is available in the User Manual for PLUS.

In the Contribution window there is a section in which information on components is entered. Information is entered for one component at a time. Do not forget to save after each component.

6.1 Component title

A title in English (max 25 characters) shall be entered in this field. The title is copied automatically from the English title of the contribution from which the component was created. If the contribution contains several components, the components shall have unique titles and the titles of the components must therefore be changed. The title should provide a comprehensible description of the component. It should be written in lower case (small letters) with the exception of the first letter and any abbreviations. Abbreviations should be of a general character, understandable by everyone. If you have a component that refers to specific organisations, for example different UN agencies, you should include the organisation's name in the title of the component.

Formulate the title so that even the uninitiated understand what the component refers to.

Avoid:

- stating the partner country's code in the title
- writing "support to" or similar phrases since these do not provide any information at all on the contribution.
- including the decision number or other identification numbers since these do not describe what the contribution refers to for the uninitiated.

7 STATISTICS

Statistical information shall be entered for each component. By clicking on the button Statistics, the Statistics window is opened. Here a large amount of different types of information shall be provided. The figures in the illustration below refer to the chapters where you will find information and references for each field.

When a new component is created, the information for the preceding component is copied to the new component. Check that the information is correct for the new component.

It is compulsory to enter the information in the Statistics window as early as the moment in time when the contribution is planned in order to facilitate planning and forecasts. Bear in mind that it is important to update the classification if there are any changes in the conditions for the contribution.

7.1 Sector

A sector is the area/sector in society that the component has the aim of developing. One component can focus on several sectors.

Classification

Sida has seven main sectors (in bold) and sub-sectors:

The main sectors are broken down into sub-sectors which are then broken down further. The codes are based on the OECD-DAC classification. They are used by several other donors. The sector codes are valid at Sida as of 23rd May 2005.

The code to be entered consists of five digits. The name of the sector selected appears automatically on the right of the field in which the sector code is entered. Under this box follows the names of the sub-sectors and the main sector that the sector comes under.

You can search for sector codes in the Sector field.

Search for codes in this way

1. Place the cursor in the Sector field and press F2 twice.
2. All codes for sectors are shown in the window.

Search for codes in a main sector or sub-sector in this way

1. Place the cursor in the Sector field and press F2
2. Enter the first figure(s) of the main sector/sub-sector and press F2. (For example 11 give a list of all sector codes under Education).
3. Mark the code you wish to use and press OK. The code is then automatically given in the Sector field.

General

The sector of destination of a contribution should be selected by answering the question “***which specific area of the recipient’s economic or social structure is the transfer intended to foster?***”. The sector classification does not refer to the type of goods or services provided by the donor. Sector specific education or research activities (e.g. agricultural education) or construction of infrastructure (e.g. agricultural storage) should be reported under the sector to which they are directed, not under education, construction, etc. Some contributions are not susceptible to allocation by sector and are reported as non-sector allocable aid (99810).

The mainsectors have nothing to do with the **operational areas** at Sida. Sida’s operational areas are based on the appropriation accounts since 2004.

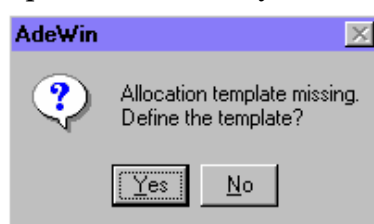

Allocation template

A component can refer to development in several sectors. In these cases you can make an allocation template.

Distribute over several sectors

1. Enter code 99888 in the Sector field and press Tab.
2. You are now in the field Allocation Template. Here you can either enter the name of an existing distribution template or the name you wish to give your new distribution template. Press Tab.
3. If the distribution template does not exist a box will appear which states that the distribution template does not exist and asks you if you wish to create a new distribution template. Press Yes if you want to have a new template.



Warning

If you use a template that you or someone else has made earlier, you should not change anything in the template. Changes to the template have the effect that all components that use the template are changed.

4. Now the window shown below will appear and you can enter a title for the distribution template in the box to the right of the code.

5. Then enter the code for a sector. You can find the code for the sector with the aid of F2.
6. Enter the sector's share in the form of a percentage of the contribution.
7. Continue to follow points 5 and 6 until 100 per cent has been distributed. Press F12 or OK to save and then press Cancel in order to return to the Statistics window.

Programme support can also be limited to a certain policy area or a certain sector (then referred to as sector programme support).

10 Sector programme support

Support which requires increased recipient involvement, in which several donors support a sector with budget funds. There may be a policy which donors support. The recipients coordinate assistance within the framework of the sector.

All components (not contract-financed technical cooperation, see code 21) which consist of transfer of know-how in the form of personnel (experts, teachers, volunteers), students and trainees, including research and other associated costs.

Contract-financed technical cooperation, short-term consultancy contributions with a competent counterpart, with the transfer of know-how as an important effect

22 Contract-financed technical cooperation – investment-related

Contract-financed technical cooperation that has the principal aim of contributing to the implementation of an investment project. Short-term consultancy contributions with a competent counterpart, with the transfer of know-how as an important effect

INTERNATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAMMES**30 International training programmes**

Training programmes with participants from low and medium income countries which have the aim of strengthening their knowledge in important areas.

CREDITS**40 Concessionary credits, tied**

Market-financed credits which Sida subsidises by paying the interest, tied to Swedish supplies.

41 Concessionary credits, untied

Market-financed credits which Sida subsidises by paying the interest, not tied to Swedish supplies.

42 Soft loans

Appropriation-financed, untied credits including 50-80% grant element for financing of projects/project components. The loan is financed and contracted by Sida but administered by the Swedish Export Credit agency (SEK).

51 Credit guarantees to banks

Undertaking to reimburse possible credit losses made by a bank in respect of specific limited credit/credits. Settlement against appropriation to be made in connection with fulfilment of obligations under the guarantee.

52 Credit guarantees to finance companies

Undertaking to reimburse possible credit losses made by a finance company regarding specific limited credit/credits. Settlement against appropriation to be made in connection with fulfilment of obligations under the guarantee.

53 Independent guarantees

Guarantee to promote investments and to make better borrowing conditions possible for project owner.

Funds for repayments of capital, interest payments (debt service) and purchase of recipient country's debt to countries other than Sweden.

63 Debt forgiveness, multilateral, IBRD

Funds for repayments of capital, interest payments (debt service) and purchase of recipient country's debt to the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD)

64 Debt forgiveness, multilateral, AfDB and AsDB

Funds for repayments of capital, interest payments (debt service) and purchase of recipient country's debt to African Development Bank (AfDB) or Asian Development Bank (AsDB)

65 Debt forgiveness, multilateral, IDB

Funds for repayments of capital, interest payments (debt service) and purchase of recipient country's debt to the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB).

66 Private debt forgiveness

Funds for repayments of capital, interest payments (debt service) and purchase of recipient country's debt to private parties, e.g. companies and banks (both Swedish and foreign)

Funds which are added to government budget revenue accounts

7.4 Target areas

The specific group/groups that the component focuses on

- Age - the age group that the component focuses on
- Sex - the sex that the component focuses on
- Target - the target group that the component focuses on
- Area - the area that the component focuses on

Classification

The target areas are broken down into four categories. One code shall be given for each category. If the contribution does not focus on a specific target group, or if it focuses on a target group that for which there is no specific code available, the code “Not specific” shall be used.

Age is the code for the age group that the component focuses on. The code Adults and children shall be used in combination with sex and give information on whether the component focuses on women and children or men and children. Here the children are both girls and boys. If the code No specific age group and women is given, this means that the component is directed towards women and girls.

Search for codes in this way:

1. Place the cursor in one of the fields Age, Sex, Target or Area and press F2 twice.
2. The window shows all codes for the group selected (Age, Sex, Target or Area).
3. Mark the code you wish to use and press OK. The code will appear automatically in the selected field.

Contributions aimed at strengthening the social structure of urban areas and improving living conditions for their populations. (The fact that the activities which are the aim of the contribution happen to be located in a town does not mean that it is urban development, for example if it concerns an office for the Chamber of Commerce, this should be classified as No specific area.)

9 No specific area

Support aimed at both rural and urban development i.e. the entire country or an area containing both rural and urban areas. Support to ministries for example shall be classified here.

7.5 Policy objectives (Action programmes in PLUS)

State the degree to which the component has the aim of promoting each policy objective.

Classification

For the goal for development co-operation, two different classifications shall be made. Firstly the importance of the policy objective for the component shall be classified (figure 0-2) and then the way in which the component contributes to reducing poverty shall be classified (capital letter A-E).

Several policy objectives can be given as the principle objective of the contribution.

ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

2 Principal objective to promote the environment and sustainable development

Components whose primary goal is to promote and improve the environment and promote sustainable management of natural resources. Components aimed at attempting to solve existing problems related to environmental degradation or containing specific measures to develop or strengthen environmental policy, legislation, capacity, administration or other organisations and instruments for protection of the environment shall be classified here. It shall clearly be stated in project documentation that the aim of the component is to promote the environment and sustainable development. Analyses concerning the environment and sustainable development must have been carried out and documented. The component would not have been implemented unless the promotion of the environment and sustainable development goal existed.

1 Significant objective to promote the environment and sustainable development

Components which partially aim at the promotion and improvement of the environment and promotion of sustainable management of natural resources. It shall be stated in project documentation that serious consideration has been paid to the environment and sustainable

development. Analyses concerning the environment and sustainable development shall have been carried out and documented. The component would have been implemented even if the goal of promotion of the environment and sustainable development did not exist.

o Not relevant to/applicable to the environment and sustainable development

Components of no importance for the environment and sustainable development are to be classified here. The reason why the component is not important for the environment and sustainable development shall be clearly stated in the documentation.

GENDER EQUALITY

2 Principal objective is to promote gender equality

Promotion of equality between women and men is the primary goal i.e. fundamental for the design of the activity and the objective it is to achieve. The component would not have been implemented without the existence of the gender equality goal. This goal shall be clearly stated in project documentation. An analysis shall have been made of the situation of women and men. The project shall also fulfil at least two additional applicable criteria, see below.

1 Significant objective is to promote gender equality

The goal of promotion of equality between women and men is important but not the primary goal of the activity in question. Gender equality is therefore a secondary goal but should still be mentioned explicitly in project documents. An analysis shall have been implemented concerning the situation of women and men. The project shall also fulfil at least two further applicable criteria, see below.

o Not relevant to/applicable to promotion of gender equality

The activity has been examined and found to lack relevance to the goal of promotion of equality between women and men. This should also be stated in project documentation.

Further applicable criteria (at least 2 must be fulfilled for principal or significant goals):

- Strategies and plans of operation consider the gender perspective, and its consequences for budgeting have not been forgotten.
- Specific measures have been taken to deal with constraints on the full and equal participation of women.
- Specific measures have been taken to ensure equal control over the results of the activity for both women and men.
- Indicators have been developed or will be developed for monitoring and evaluation which will make it possible to measure results from a gender perspective.
- Gender equality specialists have been utilised in the design phase and will be used throughout implementation and/or monitoring and/or gender equality training has been offered/is planned.
- Consultations have been held with both women and men.

PEACE, DEMOCRACY AND HUMAN RIGHTS

2 Principal objective to promote peace, democracy and human rights

Components that aim to promote peace, democracy and/or human rights (HR) shall be classified here. It shall be clearly stated in documentation that the principal objective of the contribution is the promotion of peace, democracy and/or HR. The area democracy and HR includes the development of institutions and organisations in the public sector and civil society which are important for the maintenance of peace, democracy and/or HR, citizens' economic, social and cultural rights, the rights of minorities, the rights of disabled people, the development of systems aimed at popular participation in social development, citizens' freedom of speech and expression, involvement in political life, the legal system, the rights of women and children. Goals and activities relevant for the promotion of peace, democracy and/or HR shall clearly be stated in the documentation. The project would not have been implemented if the aim to promote peace, democracy and/or HR had not existed.

1 Consideration given to peace, democracy and human rights

Components partially aimed at the promotion of peace, democracy and/or HR shall be classified here. It shall be stated in documentation that one or several of the activities are aimed at the promotion of peace, democracy and/or HR. The area of peace, democracy and HR includes

development of institutions and organisations within the public sector and the civil society which are important for the maintenance of democracy and/or HR, citizens' economic social and cultural rights, the rights of minorities, the rights of disabled people, the development of systems aimed at popular participation in social development, citizens' freedom of speech and expression, involvement in political life, the legal system, the rights of women and children. Goals and activities relevant for the promotion of peace, democracy and/or HR shall clearly be stated in the documentation. This project would have been implemented even if the aim to promote, peace, democracy and HR had not existed.

o Not relevant to/applicable to peace, democracy and human rights

Components not important for peace, democracy and/or HR are to be classified here. The reasons why the component is not important for peace, democracy and/or HR shall be clearly stated in the documentation. Components where no documentation concerning relevance to peace, democracy and/or HR is included shall also be entered here.

THE GOAL FOR DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION

This code consists of two characters - one digit and one letter, e.g. 2C

2 Principal policy objective

Poverty reduction is the primary goal of the project. That is, the project would not have been implemented if the explicit goal of reducing poverty had not existed. If the project is classified under this code, the importance of the project for poverty reduction must be illustrated by the presence of at least two of the of three following:

- Stakeholder analysis/problem analysis/goal analysis
- Design of activities
- Indicators/monitoring/evaluation

1 Important policy objective

Poverty reduction is an important but not decisive goal of the project. The project's importance for poverty reduction must be illustrated by the presence of at least one of the three following:

- Stakeholder analysis/problem analysis/goal analysis
- Design of activities
- Indicators/monitoring/evaluation

o Not aimed at the policy objective

Projects/programmes found to be meaningless or insignificant to poverty alleviation. Reasons for this must be stated in project/programme documents.

The three first categories show how much emphasis has been placed on poverty reduction in different projects. These categories are then expanded with more information on how projects have been designed to contribute to poverty reduction.

A Direct effect

Usually goal-oriented project and sector support directly aimed at poor local communities or groups of poor women, men and children.

B Projects and programmes which include the poor

Programmes or projects which demonstrably reach several social categories including the poor. Examples are: support to primary education, primary health care including sexual and reproductive health, rural roads and micro-credits.

C Indirect effect through policies and institutions

Projects or programmes which promote equitable, growth-oriented policies, macro-economic stability, reforms that include improvements for poorer groups with the aim of removing

systemic constraints at national and international levels. Examples of such contributions are legislation and institution building which promote economic and social growth and democratic governance, tax reforms and macro-economic reforms which create increased growth and revenues which can lead to income and employment opportunities for the poor.

D Support at national level which has an indirect effect on the goal

Projects which make the growth of resources and employment opportunities possible and which preserve natural resources. This group includes balance of payments support and debt relief, investments in infrastructure (including transport, telecommunications and energy), private sector development and projects for the economical use of natural resources.

E Other

8 SIDA'S DIFFERENT CONCEPTS

A summary of the definitions found in this booklet is given below.

Partner country - The partner country is the country or region that the contribution focuses on, and is often the place where the contribution is implemented. A contribution can be directed towards several countries/regions.

Sector - A sector is the area/sector in society that the component is directed towards, i.e. the aim of the component.

Operational area - Sectors differ from operational areas. The main sectors have nothing to do with the operational areas at Sida. Sida's operational areas are based on the appropriation accounts since 2004.

Type of assistance - You describe the form of support being given with the aid of type of assistance.

Implementing channel - The type of organisation that assists Sida's partners in cooperation in the practical implementation of the component.

Enter the first two figures in division's code in the ID field and press enter. This routine also applies to agreements and contracts.

- *Who should I contact to get information from PLUS?*

If you cannot find the information you want in the PLUS reports and LIS lists, it is always possible to contact the person responsible for statistics at EVU/Ekonomi for guidance.
