Sida's support to UNOPS*

In 2010, Sida made 8 contributions to United Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS) for a total of MSEK 123. This is a considerable increase given the earlier lower levels showing that UNOPS is becoming increasingly more important to Sida.

Sida's support to UNOPS by Sector

The Swedish Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA) does not give any core budget support to UNOPS. As reflected in Table 2, Sida's contributions to UNOPS are mainly in the sectors of Sustainable infrastructure (36 %),

Humanitarian Aid (25 %) and Market Development (20 %).

Sida's support to UNOPS by Region

Looking at the portfolio in terms of its geographical spread (see table 3), the support has been mainly focusing on

Contributions from Sida in support of multilateral programmes are often entitled "multibi" (multi-bilateral aid). These should be distinguished from non-earmarked or core contributions to the regular budget of multilateral institutions, which are called "multilateral aid". The latter type of support is usually disbursed by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs or another ministry.

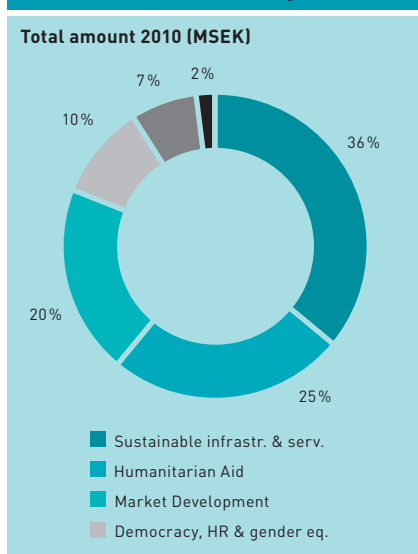
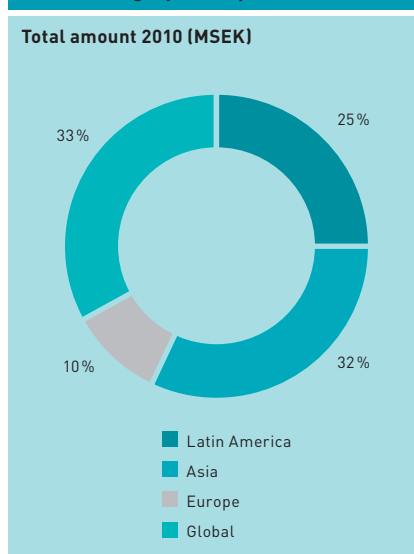


Table 3: Geographical spread

UNOP's mandate and strategic priorities

UNOPS focus area is to provide management services in the area of development assistance, and its focus areas are demand-driven, therefore reviewed annually. UNOPS customizes its services to individual client needs, offering everything from one-time stand-alone solutions to long-term project management. Core services include: Project management; Procurement; Human re-

sources management; Financial management; United Nations common services.

The current focus is to provide implementation support services to partners in the following areas: Physical infrastructure, Justice and security sector reform, Census and elections, Environment and Health.

Latin America, Asia and the Global level with no contributions so far in Africa.

The three largest country recipients in 2010 were Haiti that received emergency support and Burma that received support in the health procurement. Kosovo received support to conduct a national census. See table 4 below for a list of all contributions in 2010.
